FROM FORT COMBES: THE PEACE CONFERENCE.
FORTRESS MONROE, Feb. 4.—As you readers will not doubt be informed, we reached this place on the 21st inst. The Secretary of War has returned to Washington, and he will be at the Peace Conference on the 22nd inst. The President and Secretary of State left here at half past five o'clock yesterday afternoon. What result has been attained, if any, remains to be developed.
The President arrived here on Thursday night but did not land. The rebel commissioners returned on James River last evening. Of course there is much speculation here and many rumors as to the result of the conference, but nothing is known outside of official circles.
The steamer General Sedgwick, sailed this morning from Newbern, N. C., with mails and passengers, after landing which she proceeded to New York.
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Important Movement.
Thomas' Infantry Transferred to a New Base.
Cavalry Campaign in the Southwest.
CAIRO, January 31.—All the steers in this port—some ten or a dozen—were taken away from the hands of the Government yesterday, and taken up the Ohio, and probably up the Cumberland and Tennessee, for the transportation of a second army. It is not proper to be more explicit. Suffice it to say, that the place by General Thomas' forces, is an important change of base. It is estimated that the Ohio have also been increased for that purpose, and the fleet will be a large one.
The Tennessee and Cumberland rivers are, by the latest accounts, clear of ice, and this is a most fortunate circumstance, considering the immense use the Government now has for these rivers.
The Nashville correspondent of the Journal, writing under date of January 30, says:
There is very little of interest transpiring here just now; but the fall was broken in good time by a general advance of 10,000 cavalry into the State of Alabama. To destroy the remainder of Hood's army, to open the Alabama River to navigation, and to re-establish a second army, Thomas, and Mobile, is the task assigned to him, and whenever all is prepared he will move, and occupy Mobile. He will then receive with him a parallel of that of last December in front of this city.
