FROM THE ARMY OF THE POTOMAC

Successful Progress of the Movement on Our Left.

THE ENEMY DRIVEN TO THEIR EN-TRENCHMENTS.

From the Army of the Potomac.

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, Feb. 10.—The result of yesterday's engagement was more important than reported in my last dispatch, the particulars of which were not known here at the time. When the 5th Corps fell back to the line of works at Hatchet's Run on Monday night, the enemy did not follow very vigorously, nor did they make any attempt to storm its position.

It was believed, however, that they would do so yesterday morning, but up to now, no signs of an attack appeared—nor did they seem to be in strong force in the vicinity. It was, therefore, determined to send a reconnoissance out over the ground occupied by us the day previous, and ascertain where the enemy were, and, if possible, force them back to their works at Hatchet's Mill.

General Crawford's Division of the 5th Corps, having led the advance the day before, and being best acquainted with the nature of the country, was selected for the duty, which they performed to the entire satisfaction of the Commanding General. The column moved about noon; taking the Debney Mill road, and after advancing about half a mile struck the rebel pickets who fell back as we advanced.

A line of battle was then formed, the right resting on Hatchet's run, and the left, supported by a part of Wheaton's command of the 5th corps. The entire line then advanced cautiously through the thick woods on each side of the road and before going far, met the rebels in force, when a sharp engagement immediately began. The enemy were steadily driven back until they took refuge behind their works at the mill, where they made a determined stand.

Fighting was here kept up till dark, when our men commenced throwing up slight breastworks to protect themselves. The enemy did not seem disposed to attack again, as they had done the day previous, and the object of the movement having been accomplished by the development of their position, the troops were withdrawn, during the night to their former ground, on the Vaughn road, in the vicinity of which strong works have been erected.

The losses in the move turned out to be quite heavy, considering the small force engaged. The 31 Division of the 5th Corps suffered principally, the following being the figures.—Killed—officers 3, men 60; wounded—officers 22, men 491; missing—officers 1, men 50. Total—officers 37, men 1,143. Aggregate loss—1,150 officers and men out of 4,000 who went into the action. No doubt a large proportion of those put down as missing will appear in a few days, as is usually the case. The stragglers always keeping out of the way as long as possible. The heavy loss in the division indicates the manner in which the men acquitted themselves, and they have been highly complimented for their bravery by their commanding officers.

The losses in the 5th Corps are reported, but are very slight, they acting as a supporting column rather than as an attacking force.

Among the casualties reported are the following:—Colonel Tilden, 14th Maine, slightly; Lieut. Col. Spofford, 7th New York, slightly; Lieut. Col. Creasy, 17th Pa., severely; Col. Hancher, 11th Pa., badly wounded in the leg; Lieut. Col. Blaine, severely; Major W. Fink, 13th Pennsylvania, severely; Captain Coley, 11th Pennsylvania, do; Capt. Sankey, 1st Wisconsin, wounded; Captain J. J. Cooper, 3rd Massachusetts, do; Capt. H. N. Chamberlin, 2nd Michigan, do; Lieut. E. B. Wilkes, do; Lieut. H. S. Dricks, 6th Wisconsin, do; Lieut. Sylvester, with Pennsylvania, severely wounded in the throat; Lieut. George Johnson, 6th Wisconsin, wounded in the back; Lieut. J. H. Montour, 14th Pennsylvania, in the face slightly; Lieut. W. H. Judd, 37th New York, wounded in the leg, amputated; John Keller, do, in the leg.

Lieut.-Colonel Munro of the 4th Mississippi regt. was severely wounded and brought into the 5th Corp. hospital, where he died.

To-day there has been a short rain, but a strong head wind from the north, which has scattered the clouds, but the roads are in bad condition from the severe storm of yesterday.

THE REBEL SENATE REJECT THE PROVISION FOR ARMING THE SLAVES.

C. There Federal officers at each place have been selected and paroled to attend to the distribution of the supplies.

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
