A portion of this column moved up the river during the night and crossed Saluda and Broad Rivers, the main tributaries of the Congaree, which meet near Columbia, a few miles above the city. During the movement Gen. Beauregard evacwated the city; and on Friday morning the enemy entered and took possession without opposition.
