THE REBEL ARMY AND SUPPLIES. There is information that the evacuation of Charleston began nearly three weeks ago. A Rebel officer, who deserted and was examined at Port Royal, gave some of the details; but they were not then believed. Since that time the Rebels have been at work removing stores, though all the heavy supplies were left. The only information in regard to the Rebels is that the direction taken by them in their flight was northward, and that

their number was about fourteen theusand. An expedition of Union troops to Bull's Bay, a short time before the evacuation was, it is understood, intended to cut the railroad north of the city; but if success ful, it could have prevented the escape of only a few of the Rebels.
