## THE "CHIVALRY" PAR EXCELLENCE, PUT TO THE TEST.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY.—The report of the Department of Agriculture for the month of January has just been issued. The principal article relates to the cultivation of the hop plant, a subject which has attracted much attention during the course of the year, and has been commanded during the fall and winter. The report also furnishes a series of tables, showing the average yield per acre and average price of the crop of 1864. The report also shows that the yield of hops in 1864 was as follows: Wheat, per acre, 13 bushels; rye, 11 bushels; barley, 12 bushels; oats, 23 bushels; corn, 24 bushels. The largest production of wheat was in Connecticut—103 bushels per acre; the corn in Vermont—33.4 bushels to the acre; the oats yielded 10 bushels of wheat and 31 bushels of the acre.
