LETTER FROM WASHINGTON. (Correspondence of the Baltimore Clipper.)

The installation of a President and Vice President for another term of four years, with all its important ceremonial and interesting incidents, is over, and I venture to say that the memory of to-day will not fade from the mind of any of the thousands who participated in or witnessed the proceedings.

The weather for the previous thirty hours had been so dimly and so unfavourably made that the entire idea of anything like a procession had been abandoned by the most sanguine, while the project of holding out of doors the ceremonial of the re-installation of President Lincoln was declared utterly impracticable, and all had made up their minds, from an early hour, that the pageant would be confined to the Senate Chamber.
