It is said that the rebels are making an attempt to seize the Northside Railroad.

EXPRESSIONS OF POPULAR FEELING.

(From the Richmond Examiner, March 8.)

Two very extraordinary exhibitions of popular feeling were witnessed respectively in the North and in the South.

In the former they have been known by the name of the "Great Exhibition."

The sale of bonds in all the States is declared to reach an aggregate of several millions a day.

The high interest they bear, but not especially the general belief which prevails that the war is nearly at an end, and that the present is the last in an attempt to form which will be successful.

At the South a popular subscription is just set on foot which promises to outstrip the Northern project in the number of subscribers.

The responsibility which it elicits. The subscription which, at the suggestion of the public, has been opened by the Secretary of the Treasury, is continuing to receive donations to the Government of funds and property of every form.

A large number of contributions are being sent to the Government, and it is estimated that \$200,000 in currency, counting his proffer with the condition that twenty-four persons shall make a like donation.

The challenge was accepted, and the five million dollars thus realized by the Government will be employed in paying Gen. Lee's army.

Extraordinary subscriptions have been made of Confederate bonds, silver plate, corn supplies, and other commodities of like value.

The striking feature of these donations is that they are absolute gifts to the cause, for which the Government is not required to account in any manner.

From the indications manifested in every direction, these voluntary donations, which are extending in number and value, will probably reach several hundred millions of dollars in value.

An important feature of the scheme contemplates a contribution of rations for General Lee's army, upon a plan so simple and prompt in its execution as to insure success.

These exhibitions of patriotic liberality will have a great effect upon the army, and will tend to inspire them with a spirit about to open in terrible earnest.

When the soldiers know that the people at home are making heart and soul for them, their spirit will be raised, and their confidence in their power, even trenching upon their endurance to support and encourage their efforts, will be increased.

Anarchy Expected in Richmond.

HUNTER TO TAKE DAVIS' PLACE.

Hunter to Make Terms of Submission to the United States.

AFFAIRS ARE GETTING GLOOMY.

We have Richmond papers of the 7th.

The Examiner has a remarkable editorial in reply to a correspondence from Richmond.

The correspondent inquires "What mean these rumors of Benjamin's resignation?"

Are any Senators or Representatives whipped? Have they approached the President to press upon him any such proposition? Who were the Senators who voted the proposition?

Is there any plan on foot for the President to compromise with submission, or to resign? Is any one else ready to volunteer resignation in case he is forced to vacate his place? And if he does, who is expected to fill that place?

Is there any attempt made by rumors to create the impression that Gen. Lee is ready to consider terms for laying down arms under the pretext of preventing the sufferings and sacrifices of a forced surrender? Who are busy in these plans of surrender to submission? Speak out! The crisis demands boldness and decision and determined resistance to internal as well as external enemies. The worst enemies who now oppress us are the "whipped Senators" of Mr. Lincoln's agency. Is there any time for facious opposition or paltering with peace propositions which can lead to nothing but despair, ruin, and ruin? Terms of reconstruction now coming from Congress are nothing else but submission. Let us know where the Enquirer, in response to its correspondent, says it cannot answer all the questions asked, for want of information, and then goes on in the following remarkable and significant language, showing unmistakably that the rebellion is in its death throes.

The Enquirer says: "That there is a party of whipped accusers in Richmond cannot be denied. They are cowardly and cowardly miserable wretches who brought the war upon the country, and who would now surrender to the enemy. We have no doubt but that there is a plan on foot for Mr. Davis to resign, and that Mr. Stephens has consented to resign, and that Mr. Hunter, as President of the Senate, would be elected."

The plan we hope and believe has miscarried; at any rate the "conspirators" may understand that if they should succeed they will have placed a barren scepter in their grasp, and that they will be treated with an unaltered hand.

Robert H. Lee, by and with the advice and consent of the army and the people, will grasp the scepter they may wrench from the hands of Mr. Davis and wield it in the name of the people.

"Whipped accusers" shall capitulate this country into slavery and cruelty at the hands of the rebels, and the country shall be a scene of anarchy and blood.

The Congress has utterly failed—it is incompetent, and is doing much injury—it has neither capacity or courage, and is wanting in firmness and resolution—it is unfit for revolution. The very men who were the foremost to secede, are the first to surrender.

The single head and a single arm is now needed, and if the Congress will not furnish it, the people will furnish it.

The Virginia banks can furnish one or two millions in gold, and this will secure the supplies now needed. Let the Legislature promptly act, and turn the gold over to Lee. The Congress is deficient in the ordinary means of doing business, and is without funds to carry out its policy.

Those who talk now of compromise mean submission to subjugation.

THE ESTABLISHMENT OF NEGROES.

The Enquirer says "The Confederate Senate bill for the enlistment of negroes in the military service, was on yesterday passed by a vote of 23 to 12."

The bill is a step in the right direction, and is a step towards the emancipation of the colored people.

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Later from Charleston.

HERMAN SAID TO HAVE BRACED UP CHARLESTON, NORTH CAROLINA.

New York, March 9.—The steamer Fulton, from Hilton Head on the 6th, has arrived. Everything was progressing favorably at Charleston. Traders are beginning to open their stores. General Hatch is in command of the Northern District of the Department of the South, and General Schimmelfennig is in command of Charleston, and the railroad has been repaired to Goose Creek. General Foster had advanced to the Santos River, without opposition.

Newspapers have been received of the total destruction of Columbia.

At last report General Sherman had arrived at Charleston, N.C. and Beauregard was hovering in his front.

The 21st colored regiment recruited in Charleston, has been mustered into service at Charleston.

Several blockade runners have returned to Havana, having failed to run into Mexico.

The Emperor Maximilian has had a special audience with Mr. Scarlett, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the Queen of England.

The Mexican press publish long lists of diplomatic appointments made by the Emperor to foreign governments. No appointments are made to the new Secretary of the Treasury.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The principal officers of the Treasury Department waited in a body to-day upon the Hon. Hugh McCulloch to congratulate him upon his accession to the Secretaryship.

In the course of his speech he said: "My duty is to do all in my power to provide the means to discharge the claims upon the Treasury at the earliest day practicable, and to institute measures to bring the business of the country gradually back to the specie basis, a departure from which, although for the time being a necessity, is no less damaging and demoralizing to the people, than expensive to the Government."

FROM THE GULF SQUADRON.—PHILADELPHIA, March 9.—The United States steamer Bermuda, from the East and West Gulf Blockading Squadrons, has arrived at the Navy Yard. She was due here on Monday afternoon, but in consequence of rough weather and the breaking of the cable, she was delayed. She is now at the Navy Yard, and is being refitted.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The Senate in Executive Session to-day confirmed a large number of military appointments, including Brig. Gen. Hawkins, to be chief of staff to Lieut. Gen. Grant, and Col. Jordan, of the 9th Pennsylvania Regiment, to be Brigadier General by brevet.

The Senate confirmed many miscellaneous nominations, among them Charles S. Williams, to be District Attorney, and A. F. Campbell, to be Marshall, of the United States Court for the State of New York, to be held in Brooklyn.

THE 7-30 LOAN.

PHILADELPHIA, March 9.—Jay Cooke, reports subscriptions to the 7-30 loan, amounting to \$1,465,150, including \$357,000 from Chicago and \$1,108,150 from New York. The single subscription of \$50 and \$100 each.

MISSOURI NEWS ITEMS.

CAVE HOLE DR.—The terrible accident on the Philadelphia and Trenton Railroad is reported to have been caused by the falling of a large rock from a cliff above the track. The rock was estimated to weigh several tons, and it fell upon the train, causing the death of several persons and the injury of many others.

THE PHILADELPHIA RAILROAD.—The Philadelphia and Trenton Railroad is reported to have been closed for several days, in consequence of the accident at Cave Hole. The railroad is now being repaired, and it is expected that it will be open again in a few days.

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
