Major General Dix, New York: The following official confirmation of the capture of Richmond and announcing that the city is on fire, has just been received by this Department.

CITY POINT, Va., April 3, 11 A. M .-General Weitzel telegraphs as follows:

"We took Richmond at 8.15 this morn-"I have captured many guns! "The enemy left in great haste.

The city is on fire in one part, and I am making every effort to put it out, The people received us with enthurisation expressions of joy!

Gen. Grant started early this morning with his army toward the Danville Railroad to cut off Lee's retreating army if possible.
