18 THOUSAND A CRIME!

The leading spirits of the rebellion at Richmond make a call in the Whig of Wednesday, for a meeting of the "General Assembly of Virginia," the red "General Assembly of Virginia," and have the hardihood to specify others who are to meet in conjunction with them, to do what? To submit to the Government they have so long defied! To restore the State to the Union? Nothing of the sort! We quote:

"The masters to be submitted to the Legislature are the restoration of peace to the State of Virginia, and the adjustment of questions involving life, liberty and property, that have arisen in the State as a consequence of the war."

That is the very discreet programme laid down by some of those who have been guilty in bringing a deluge of sorrow and bloodshed upon the country, whilst endangering their own interests, and whilst expressing not a solitary regret for what has occurred, or any criticism at the prospective restoration of the Union, they are found calling upon men who have been most prominent in those following in ignominy to join them in yet retaining the lead in Virginia. John Esten, Fayette McMillin, and others of the same stamp, are again to be thrust—or are to thrust them to the front in this matter, men whose doors should forever have palmed their tongues with shame and remorse for the untold horrors they have already been instrumental in bringing upon the people of Virginia. Guilty of treason, stained with the blood of the innocent, disenchanted if crime has power to work such a result, what business have they to move in the matter referred to at all, and how can the Government of the United States, by any of its functionaries, venture to ignore their treason, their boundless guilt, allowing such men as John Minor Botts and hundreds of others who have nobly stood up for the right at the peril of their lives, to be overshadowed by miscreants like those who figure in the call referred to? He noted, that this call is officially "approved" by the Federal commandant at Richmond.

As matters have taken a turn in that city, the rose water policy appears entirely predominant; and had the other guilty spirits likewise, who fled in hot haste from that retribution the consciousness of deep guilt led them to express, known how little they had to fear, what need had they to fly at all. Let it be noted further, that one of the masters to be looked after in the programme referred to, is that of "property," the fear of "confiscation," which formerly was "athwart on their souls," having doubles been nearly done away with by the exhibition of the very presumption of fours taking in the rebel capital. Whilst loyal men here supposed that the leading plotters, like Campbell, would upon the taking of the rebel capital, be consigned to those vile prisons which by their orders have been so long occupied by Union men, word comes that there is no end to the captivity shown there, the slaves being captured by the act of changing the black attire pasted to keep the rebel general's wife from being disturbed, for white ones, let the presence of the colored troops should prove offensive! Truly, let them get along, and we may all our officials at Higher too.

And the latest news in relation to these masters is that the rebel general, with his "staff," is to visit City Point in grand style, then Washington, and next—we have the authority of the New York Commercial for it—that "rooms have been engaged at one of our New York fashion able hotels for Gen. Robert E. Lee, late in command of the rebel army in Northern Virginia."

Now we do not believe this. And yet the mere fact that such an item as that is gravely put forth in a reputable journal, to find currency in other prominent papers, such as the New York Times, shows that the good natural public is to be prepared for almost anything of the kind.

But this is the entertainment to which the nation has been invited through so many terrible sacrifices! Are these rebel leaders to still live, to be tolerated, etc. Amongst those whose sons and brothers have perished at their hands! Let this thing go on, and the insolence born of it will be tolerated, and not six months before these very men who have dragged the nation through the blood and mire of a four years' war, will be the leading heroes of Washington high life, their mode be influential to dispense

their sway be again potent for ill!

In view, then, of what is happening, in view of this extraordinary and untiring energy of the criminals, let us by all means cease to implore or hang the small fry, the dupes of their magnificence, those who have been the tools of Union soldiers. Let us call back Gen. Davis himself, because it is his misfortune that he is over, silent, impotent, cold-blooded; that he has not the captivating gravity of that he has the bold and boldness of his bloody cohorts. Let the tool of land of his bloody cohorts. Proclaim a wholesale amnesty, by all means, recognizing the greatest crimes that ever disgraced, blundered, attempted or committed the pages of history as her most illustrious characters.

A PEARL fishing enterprise is just announced in New York. A Company chartered by that State, of which Mr. John Chadwick is president, has been organized with \$1,000,000 capital, for the purpose of gathering pearls and pearl shells on the Pacific coast.
