DICK TATLOR. MEMPHIS, via CAIRO, May 3.-The versel at Key West, Florids, on the 23 Bulletin's special says it is reported that the rebel General Dick Taylor sent Gen. Hoge a notice from General Dana of the surrender of Johnston to Sherman, and informed him of the terms of surrender. Gen. Dana immediately gave full credit to Dick Taylor's statement, and arranged in mourning, flags placed at half mast and an armistice with Hoge, the terms of which agreed to an entire cessation of hostilities, each retaining the right to
