ral Mcward, the Commissioner of CIRCULAR NO. 3. WAR DEPARTMENT, BUREAU OF FREEDMEN, REFUGEES AND ADANDONED LANDS, WASHINGTON, May 22, 1565. Whereas, a large amount of land in Virginia, and in other States that have been in insurrection, has been abandoned by disloyal owners, and is now being cultivated by freedmen; and whereas, the owners of such lands are attempting to obtain possession of them and thus deprive the freedmen of the fruits of their industry, it is ordered that all abandoned lands in such States, now under cultiva-

The above order will not be so construed as to relieve disloyal persons from the consequences of their disloyalty, and the application for the restoration of their lands by this class of persons will in no case be entertained by any military au-
