### ARRIVAL OF THE AFRICA.

HALIFAX, July 19.—The steamer Africa arrived here to-day with advices from Liverpool to July 8th, and from Queenstown, to the 9th last.

The reported seizure of the pirate Rappahannock at Southampton is false. The vessel is safely in dock at Liverpool.

Further correspondence between the French and British Governments on the occasion of the American war is published.

Earl Russell says it is the opinion of the British Government that ships belonging to the confederate government and not lawfully transferred to other owners be detained as public property by the Federal Government and any transfer claim must be decided in an ordinary course of law by civil tribunals.

In a dispatch to the British Minister at Washington, Earl Russell says that an attempt to commission ships of war cannot, during the continuance of the war, be relieved from risk of capture and condemnation by any sale or transfer to neutral nations. The order, the cable agent in London, has suspended publication.

### WASHINGTON ITEMS.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—A statement has been republished in some of the newspapers that the Paymaster General will immediately make requisitions upon the Secretary of the Treasury for \$200,000,000 for soldiers pay up to the 1st of July. This appears to be a mistake, for on inquiry to-day it was ascertained that probably \$150,000,000 will be paid at that date to soldiers mustered out and to those who remain in service to the above named date.

The issue of new certificates of indebtedness does not equal the amount of those continually maturing, and the reduction in this description of debt has been from two hundred and fifty millions to less than one hundred and fifteen millions. It is probable from present indications that the Secretary will be able to meet the requirements on the Treasury under the powers conferred by the late Congress without having occasion to resort to maturing loans.

The Navy Department has no chartered vessels in its employment, and therefore no money in due to its owners as has been commonly stated.

The receipts under the internal revenue law are increasing and encouraging.

The Secretary of the Treasury telegraphed to the Assistant Treasurer at San Francisco to-day discontinuing the sale of the F.W., as the entire loan will be taken before another supply of notes can reach him.

It is stated in official quarters that it is the intention of the government to reduce the army to one hundred thousand, if not to fifty thousand men at the earliest practicable period.

## THE ATLANTIC WELLSHAPE.

NEW YORK, July 19.—A private letter from Cyrus Field states that the Great Eastern cable probably leaves the port on the 11th, and Valencia on the 15th of July. All representatives of the press of England, America and France are to be excluded from the Great Eastern during the laying of the cable, the telegraph construction company having charge of the undertaking believing this course necessary, as some members of the press contain prejudiced opinions, and the engineers and their assistants are engaged in their highly important duties.

The journal of the trip and its results will however be furnished the associated Press immediately upon the arrival of the Great Eastern on this side, and the connection being made with the shore at the terminus of the line. As the cable across the Gulf of St. Lawrence between Bristol, N. B., and Newfoundland is now being laid, it is probable the message from and to the cable will have to be sent across the gulf by steamer, which will delay the press reports from four to six hours.

Should there be enough of the Atlantic cable left to stretch across the gulf, eighty miles, it is confidently expected, it will be understood, be immediately laid, and thus, in a few days, not only restore the continuity of New York and Newfoundland lines, but place the two continents in uninterrupted telegraphic communication.

## NEW JERSEY POLITICS.

TRENTON, N. J., July 19.—The Republican Union Convention for the nomination of a candidate for Governor, will meet here on Thursday. Numerous candidates are named for the position, including Marcus L. Ward, George T. Cobb, Cornelius Walsh, James M. Soval, Geo. M. Robeson, Alexander G. Cattell and Joseph C. Potts. Ward and Cattell are the principal competitors. As between the two it will be an exciting convention.

AT THE PUBLIC HEARING IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, JULY 19, 1865.
