THOMAS BUCHANAS READ THE LADIES "REGULATING" THE LIQUUR TRAFFIC IN GREEN-FIELD, OHIO. [From the Hillsboro (Oh'o) News.]

Our neighboring town of Greenfield was the scene of unusual excitement last week growing out of an attack upon the liquor relling establishments by a number of h dies belonging to the most respectable families of the place.

From the account in the Republican of last week, it seems that on Monday morn ing a meeting of ladies was bold, at which] evils of intemperance, declaring the law insufficient to abate them, and justifying a resort to forcible measures for that pur-

About two o'clock on the afternoon of the same day about twenty-five ladies (some of them armed with hatchets and axes) appeared in front of Newbeck's saloon, on Main street, the doors of which were closed in expectation of a visit. A fer reading the resolutions the ladies de manded a surrender of the liquers on the premises. During the proceedings at Mr. Linn' Mayor Eckman appeared on the ground and read the riot act, but without effect The "regulators" next visited Dr. Slagle's drug store, on the same side of the street. The doctor, deeming "discretion the better part of valor," surrendered his stock of liquors on demand, much to the satisfaction of his fair visitors. The drug store of Norton & Robinson was ment visited, but the proprietors made Uf resistance, whereupon a parley took place, which resulted in their agreeing to ship all their liquors away by rai road the following morning. This satisfied the ladies, and the contract was faith fully performed on the part of Messrs. N. & R. Mr. Binder's store was nex Visited, and he agreed to the same conditions as Norton & Robinson. Mr. Mor Tis' saloon was next in order. He quietly gave up his liquors, having but a small stock on hand.

Mr. Newbeck's loss is stated at \$550 Mr. Linn's \$1500, Dr. Slagle's \$625. The next scene in the drama was the commencement of legal proceedings against the ladies engaged in the destruction of the liquor, and their busbands, for the recovery of damages.
