WASHINGTON, July 27 .- The power to effect further loans is now exhausted, but the Secretary of the Treasury is of the opinion that owing to the continued reduction of the expenditures of the Government, the Treasury can be kept in an | easy condition by the receipts from the usual sources of revenue and meet all reanisitions which can be properly made

upon it until the meeting of Congress. It is estimated at the Internal Revenue Bureau that the receipts from incomes, taxes, &c., for the next 75 days will be at the rate of \$1,000,000 a day.
