The Saxonia at New York.

Latest from Europe.
New York, Sept. 3.—The steamer Saxonia has arrived with Southampton advices of August 23d.
The steamer East Eastern had arrived at Sheerness. Capt. Anderson, it is said, fully believes in being able to lay the Atlantic Cable, and is bringing the manufacture of a new cable and preparing pick up apparatus, by May 1866. There is to be a new cable and afterwards pick up the old one and continue to lay the same.
The Atlantic Telegraph Company has resolved to lay a new cable in June next, and pick up the old one in August next. Capt. Anderson, to the Times, says that orders were immediately forwarded to stop the Sheerness cable on the termination of the war.
The French and English squadrons will arrive at Spithead on the 25th August.
The cattle plague continues around London.
Consols closed at 97 1/2 for money.
France Renten closed at 67 francs 10 centimes.
United States Five-Twenties have recovered, closing at 97.
By the convention based on the Austro-Prusso-Danish treaty of peace, concluded at Gastein, Prussia gave Luenburg, paying Austria a pecuniary indemnity. Prussia will not allow Austria to retain Luenburg until the future of the Duchies is decided.
The Emperor and Empress of France arrived in Switzerland.
The English squadron arrived at Brest on the 21st of August.
The cholera is disappearing at Constantinople, but also at Gibraltar, Barcelona and Valencia.
The Suez Canal food gates have been opened, and a vessel laden with coal passed direct from the Mediterranean to the Red Sea on the 1st of August.
It is denied that a financial arrangement exists between the Italian Government and the Holy See, for the settlement of the Roman debt.

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER PERUVIAN.

APPAINS IN TEXAS.

New York, Sept. 3.—The steamer Morning Star, from New Orleans on the 26th of Aug., has arrived. Late Texas papers contain the following:
Thomas C. Moore, one of the Recorders of Judge Denies' court at Austin, has been arrested by the Provost Marshal; the charge is not stated. Other arrests have been made upon charges of making away with public property after the surrender of the Chief Clerk.
The Texas papers are filled with articles discussing the situation in which Southerners are placed by the failure of the rebellion, and they are counselling loyalty to the Old Government.

WASHINGTON TERMS.

WASHINGTON, September 2.—Secretary Welles and Mr. William Faxon, Chief Clerk of the Navy Department, left here this morning for Connecticut. They expect to be absent some three or four weeks. Assistant Secretary Fox will be Acting Secretary of the Navy, during the absence of Secretary Welles, and Mr. Thompson, of the Department, will discharge the duties of Chief Clerk.
Each boat arriving here from the South brings an increasing number of pardon seekers. This being a general reception day at the Executive mansion, the building was literally lined with them.
The internal revenue receipts yesterday amounted to nearly two and a half millions.

FROM FORT LARAMIE.

Fort Laramie, Sept. 1.—The wagon party under Colonel Sawyer, from Sioux City, arrived at Fort Conner, on Powder River, after many hardships, in destitute condition. They report the route by Niobrara and White rivers impracticable. They were sometimes two days without water. The Indians attacked them several times but were driven off. They lost nearly all their provisions. Col. Sawyer's brother, the route to Montana from this place, via Fort Conner and Clark's Fork, is reported practicable.

THE PROPOSED FRENCH EXPOSITION.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—The Government evidently regards the French Universal Exposition for 1867 with much interest. From additional information it will be seen that the probability is that it will be held in the city of Lyons. Hence the importance that the American public should be informed of some facts in relation to it in order that those who intend to exhibit the productions of American art or industry may make reasonable preparations, commensurate with their resources, of the exhibition, and such as will be creditable to our national character. The Exposition is to open on the 1st of April, 1867, and to close on the 31st of October of the same year.
All applications for admission of articles to be exhibited, with a description thereof, must be presented before the 31st of October, 1866; prior to which time, also, a plan or chart of the site to be occupied, respectively, must be made by the foreign commissioners on a prescribed scale and sent to the building commissioner. Detailed plans of articles and their distribution in the space assigned them must be furnished on the same scale by our own commissioners, as well as materials for the official catalogue, before the 31st of January, 1866. As Congress has not been in session since the proposed exhibition was determined upon, and as that body will not convene until the limit fixed for the applications and other preliminary proceedings of the exhibition has passed, and as our Government is consequently without any appropriation of legal authority which will enable the Executive to take steps involving an expenditure, it would be well for the leading representatives of the classes interested in the matter to concert such measures as may be deemed expedient to promote a creditable representation of the United States.
It may be presumed that Congress will do as much, if not more, than on a similar occasion heretofore, in providing for the transportation of articles and other respects. It is understood that a pamphlet giving a full statement of all the conditions and regulations of the exhibition will be distributed by the State Department as soon as it can be printed. It will be remembered that in April last, a correspondence between Mr. Seward and the French Minister on the subject, when the Prince Napoleon, who has since resigned, was President of the Imperial Commission, has published a pamphlet from Mr. Seward to Mr. Higginson, of the 5th of April, was included, in which the latter was authorized to act as special agent on the part of the United States.
Mr. Higginson subsequently designated N. M. Beckwith, Esq., an American gentleman of distinction and eminent qualifications, reading in Paris as special Commissioner on behalf of the United States. The gentleman's return was accompanied to assume the position, subject to the approval of Congress when it shall convene. It may then be safe to assume that it would be advisable that any parties in the United States who desire to secure a place for articles in the Exposition should address their application to N. M. Beckwith, Esq., Special Commissioner of the United States for the French Universal Exposition, 1867, at the United States Legation, Paris. This should be done in time to reach him before the 31st of October, and should be accompanied with all the details as to the nature and dimensions of the articles to be exhibited.

THE NATIONAL DEBT STATEMENT OF SECRETARY McCULLOCK.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Secretary McCulloch today publishes a statement of the public debt, as appears from the following: Accounts of bonds and securities in the Department on the 31st of August, 1865. The recapitulation is as follows:
Amount of outstanding debt bearing interest in coin, \$1,106,215,191; interest, \$61,500,500; debt bearing interest in gold, \$1,274,473,103; interest, \$73,331,057; debt on which interest has ceased, \$1,503,929,029; Total debt, \$2,985,113,719; interest, \$135,161,625; U. S. notes, old issue, \$432,758,001; compound interest notes, act of March 3d, 1863, \$15,000,000; compound interest notes, act of July 26th, 1864, \$222,020,160; Total, \$4,841,132,809.
As contrasted with the statement published 31st of July, the principal has been increased only \$275,000 within the last month, while the interest on the debt has decreased nearly \$211,000. The legal-tender notes have been reduced \$1,057,000. The amount of coin now in the Treasury is \$45,500,000, or about \$10,000,000 more than a month ago. The currency now in the Treasury is \$410,000,000, or about \$1,100,000,000, showing a reduction of currency in the Treasury for the past month of \$35,500,000. The suspended requisitions amount to a little over \$3,000,000.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

ALBANY, September 2.—An accident occurred to the steamboat express train over the Central road, due here at seven o'clock, by the breaking of an axle. The baggage car was thrown off the track, and the baggage was scattered all over the ground. The driver was killed. The express messenger and one or two other persons were slightly hurt. None of the passengers were hurt.

PERMIT TO VISIT ALEXANDER H. STEPHENS.

BOSTON, September 1.—The brother of Alexander H. Stephens, in company with Colonel Johnson, a friend of both brothers, went down to Fort Warren this morning, with a permit to visit the late rebel Vice President.

THE SEARCH FOR MCCAULAND.

WASHINGTON, September 1.—The efforts of the government to arrest the rebel General McCauland, under indictment in Pennsylvania, has not succeeded. He has left for Paris unknown.

REDUCTION OF THE ARMY.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—Orders have been issued for disbanding thirty more regiments of infantry, cavalry, and artillery.

FROM FORTRESS MONROE.

FORTRESS MONROE, September 2.—On the arrival of the steamer Adelaide from Baltimore this morning two colored men were taken to the lock up by the guard, having, during the passage down the bay, been detected in robbing a gentleman of \$1,000 and a lady of her jewelry. Through the vigilance of Mr. Charles Kliesen, clerk of the Adelaide, the thieves were detected and the stolen property recovered.
