INTERESTING ABOUT THE CATTLE

DISEASE.

Whatever may be the origin of the dis-

order, the problem of stopping its pro-

gress has not yet been solved, in spite of

all that scientific wisdom has suggested.

Veterinary skill seems to be nearly

powerless, and the task is rather of stay-

ing the disease by destruction than cure.

Medical gentlemen, who have made

careful inquiries whether any persons

who have attended upon the diseased ani-

mals have been in any way affected, say

that no single instance of the kind has

come to their knowledge. But in relation

to the effect which the milk and flesh of

diseased animals may have upon the

health of those who consume, either

through ignorance or otherwise, there are

some facts stated which are most alarm-

ing. Kittens fed upon the milk of a cow

sick of the disease in two days "the post mortem ap-

pears—general inflammation of the in-

testines, stomach, brain, &c.; the blood

is milious pus; red globules decomposed as

though it had been subjected to strong

fumes of hydrogen." It is stated in an

article in one of the London papers,

signed by a physician, that "a suspicious

infection is daily manifesting itself

amongst infants, particularly those be-

tween the ages of two and eight months.

The symptoms are an erratic typhus,

with a spurious phrenitis, pneumonia,

constipation or diarrhea, and petechiae;

indeed, all the exact characteristics arise

from the spasmodic motion.
