ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER ASIA. Another Atlantic Cable to be Laid

Later from Europe.
Hull, Sept. 14.—The steamer Asia, from Liverpool, via Queenstown, on the 3d, has arrived.

THE PRISONER TRIAL.
Washington, Sept. 14.—Colonel Chairman this morning read to the Military Commission a note addressed to him by George West, Captain and Military Superintendent of the Old Capitol Prison, dated to-day, enclosing a communication from Dr. Ford, Surgeon of the post, relative to the condition of Captain Wirt, in which he states that "the prisoner is somewhat better, but unable to leave his room to-day."
The Commission, desirous of obtaining further information on the subject, dispatched an orderly in quest of Dr. Ford, who this morning could not be found either at the Old Capitol or at his residence.
After a recess the messenger returned saying that he could not find that gentleman. Mr. Baker said he saw Capt. Wirt yesterday afternoon at four o'clock. His mind was evidently much improved, but could not be seen in any subject. Mr. Baker took hold of his limbs which seemed perfectly without strength. He held them up and letting go, they fell like those of a dead person. The prisoner did not seem to have any control over himself. So far as he was able to judge, Capt. Wirt seemed like a man broken up. He supposed the prisoner was under the influence of opiates. Though Capt. Wirt might be again prostrate for a day, the physical exhaustion and mental excitement would have to adjourn over, but by adjourning over now for a few days, the prisoner might acquire strength enough to go on without further interruption.
The defendant was most anxious that the trial should be brought to an end, in reply to a question of the President was comfortable as he could be in the Old Capitol.
