THE WIFE TRIAL.
THE PROSECUTION CLOSD.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—This morning the trial of Mrs. Wright was resumed at the Capitol, and the prisoner was brought in and took his place on the sofa next his counsel, Mr. Schurz, whose colleague, Mr. Baker, is absent. The room is crowded to-day, the ladies being more numerous than usual.

The examination of witnesses was resumed. Sergeant G. W. Gray, who was on the stand yesterday, being cross-examined by Mr. Schurz, gave some additional particulars concerning the treatment of prisoners by the army.

Captain J. W. Wright was recalled, but his testimony was principally to show that forelocks had been given by the army and men under his command.

Lieutenant Dyer, of the 12th U. S. Colored Regiment, testified to the general treatment of the prisoners, and of the whipping of some of the colored troops. He said Capt. Wright had never ill-treated him.

In this juncture a recess was taken for half an hour.

On resuming at 1.30, Judge Advocate Chipman said there were some letters in the letter-book he would call the attention of the court to.

Col. Chipman replied the evidence referred to Jefferson Davis, Lee and others, and the counsel had no right to object to any evidence not directly affecting his client.

Col. Chipman here announced that the prosecution informally closed their case.

RAVAGES OF THE CHOLERA AT CHARLESTON.
