THE TESTOATH FOR MEMBERS OF CORGRESS-THE PRESIDENT VIEWS ASKED FOR.

WASHEIGTON, Sept. 27 .- A letter was recently addressed by some of the citizens. of Charlottesville, Va., to President Johnson, prompted by the difficulties which surround them in relation to the approaching Congressional election. They appeal to him for counsel and advice as to their proper course of action, being wholly uninformed as to whether the test oath will probably be repealed or modified so as to admit Southern members. They have thought it possible that he might enlighten them on the autiject. They say their main purpose is to pursue that course which will be most likely to sustain him and his policy in the administration of the Government.

The Attorney General to whom the letter was referred, replied that he is instructed by the President to say "that Le has no means of knowing what Congress may do in regard to the oath about which they inquire than any other citizen, but it is his earnest wish that loyal and true men to whom no objection can be made, should be elected to Congress." This, Mr. Speed says, is not an official letter, but a simple expression of individual opinion and wish.
