THE MURDERS OF THE CHOLERA.

The State Department is in receipt of the following intelligence relative to the progress of the cholera. Dispatches received from the United States Consul Bandini, Italy, dated August 30, say that the Asiatic cholera made its appearance on the Adriatic coast of the Island of Sicily, and at the present time the dispatches received are spreading in all directions. America was the first place to feel the fatal effects of this terrible scourge, and the death toll for a long time averaged about one hundred per day, but it has now begun to have a more rapid increase, and some 15,000 cases being reported daily, a small town in San Severo, a place of some 1,000 inhabitants. The death average is about sixty per day, and the disease is still rapidly increasing.

A few cases of the cholera have been detected in Sicily, and in every place it has spread, it has been fatal.

The Consul at Bandini says the disease seems to be spreading gradually in all directions over Europe, and is quite likely to find its way to the United States, but the autumnal western winds may impede or postpone its march across the Atlantic.

The U. S. Consul at Constantinople, writing to the Department, under date of August 25th, reports that there is no cholera in that port, but that it is continually increasing, and is rapidly spreading, and is confidently believed that the city will be free from the scourge within ten days. The official reports show the number of deaths from the cholera to be 1,000,000 since the 1st of July.
