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STATE ARCHIVES ANNUAL REPORT FY 2024

OVERVIEW



The State Archives was created in 1935 as the Hall of Records and reorganized under its present name in 1984 (Chapter 286, Acts of 1984). Upon that reorganization the Commission on Artistic Property was made part of the State Archives.

As Maryland's historical agency, the State Archives is the central depository for government records of permanent value. Records date from the founding of the Maryland colony in 1634 through the beginning of this century. These records are described in the State Archives' Guide to Government Records. They are in manuscript, print, and electronic formats, and include colonial and State executive, legislative, and judicial records; county court, land, and probate records; publications and reports of State, county, and

municipal governments; business records; records of religious bodies; and special collections of maps, newspapers, photographs, and private papers.

STATE ARCHIVIST



Elaine Rice Bachmann was appointed as State Archivist and Commissioner of Land Patents by Governor Larry Hogan in June of 2021. The State Archivist also serves as the State Historical Records Coordinator for the Maryland Advisory Board of the National Historical Publications and Records Commission. She also serves on the MD250 Commission, as well as the Maryland Public Art Commission of the Maryland State Arts Council.

ADMINISTRATION

In July 1986, when the State Archives moved into its present building on Rowe Boulevard across from the Supreme Court of Maryland, Administration was responsible for Accounting and

Personnel. In July 2007, the Administration Department reorganized to oversee and manage three functions: Fiscal Affairs, Administration, and Personnel.

Administration

The Administration Unit provides comprehensive accounting, procurement, budget administration, and human resources support in compliance with all applicable state laws, regulations, and policies in support of the Archives' operations and overall mission. The Director of Administration is the Fair Practices Officer for the Archives.

Fiscal Administration

The Fiscal Administration Unit provides guidance to Archives' senior management on fiscal and budgetary matters. The staff tracks and monitors expenditures, processes accounts payables and receivables, maintains employee leave and payroll records, deposits cash receipts, and compiles and submits all mandated financial reports. The Unit manages inventory control including fixed assets, supplies, and materials in accordance with state inventory standards. The unit manages travel services and oversees fleet services.

The Procurement Unit obtains all necessary supplies, materials, and services required by the Archives to fulfill its mission in accordance with all applicable state procurement laws and regulations. The unit is also responsible for contract and grant administration.

Fiscal Administration staff develop the Operating Budget and Managing for Results submissions annually and evaluate, manage, and make budget recommendations based on the needs of the Archives throughout the year.

Personnel

All human resources functions are currently assigned to the Maryland Department of Budget and Management's Personnel Unit, under the guidance of the Archives' Director of Administration. Administration staff analyze the current workforce and determine the strategy to prepare for future staffing needs. Workforce planning analyzes current staff assignments to recommend training and development and initiate staff recruitments to meet succession planning needs.

Fair Practices Office

The Fair Practices Office leads the Equal Opportunity Officer and Americans with Disabilities Act Coordinator to administer and enforce the state and federal equal opportunity laws and policies and to assist in the building of a well-diversified workforce for the Archives' employees and applicants.

ARTISTIC PROPERTY AND EXHIBITS

In 1969, the Commission on Artistic Property was formed (<u>Chapter 111, Acts of 1969</u>). It was incorporated into the State Archives in 1984 (<u>Chapter 286, Acts of 1984</u>).

Artistic Property and Exhibits began in 1991 as Exhibits, reformed as Education and Outreach in 1989, and later was renamed Education, Outreach, and Artistic Property. It became Artistic Property and Public Outreach in May 1999, and reorganized as Artistic Property, Preservation, and Public Outreach in August 2003. Renamed Artistic Property and Public Outreach in

February 2014, it was placed under the Deputy State Archivist in October 2015, and reformed as Artistic Property and Exhibits in July 2016.

This department oversees three main units: Artistic Property Collections; the State House Office of Interpretation; and State House Trust and Government House Support.

ARTISTIC PROPERTY COLLECTIONS

The Commission on Artistic Property is the official custodian of all valuable paintings and other decorative arts owned by or loaned to the State. It provides for the acquisition, location, proper care, custody, restoration, interpretation, and preservation of the state-owned art collection. The collection contains works of art and decorative arts that have either been commissioned by the state or acquired since the colonial period. Such works have been displayed and used in state buildings from the 17th century to the present day. In 1996, on behalf of the state, the Commission assumed ownership of the art collection of the Peabody Institute, thereby expanding the collection to include works of art by European artists, including paintings, sculpture, textiles, and works on paper dating from the 16th century through the 19th century. In total, there are over 4,000 works of art in the state's collection.

The Commission consists of fifteen members. Eight members are appointed by the State Archivist with the approval of the Governor and seven serve ex officio. With the Governor's approval, the State Archivist names the chair (Code State Government Article, secs. <u>9-1016</u> through <u>9-1023</u>).

Overview and Highlights

In FY2024, Susan Nininger (Executrix of the Richard Adams Nininger Estate) donated 17 works of art by Florence and Kate Mackubin. Florence Mackubin has the distinction of painting the most gubernatorial portraits in the state-owned art collection. Although less prominent, Kate Mackubin was equally as talented as her sister. The works of art include one oil painting, two watercolors, three miniatures, four sketchbooks, and seven pastels. There are plans to do an exhibition in the near future to highlight the works of art in the state-owned collection by Florence and Kate Mackubin.

The traveling exhibition *Treasures of State: Maryland's Art Collection* at the Washington County Museum of Art came to an end, but two works of art, *One Who Can Read* [MSA SC 4680-10-003] and *The Founding of Maryland* [MSA SC 1545-2551], remain on loan for the public to enjoy in their galleries.

In October, Robin Gower joined the staff as Curator. Since that time she has played an integral part in conducting research and outreach for the Commission.

Ms. Gower created and presented a lecture, "The USS *Maryland's* Silver Service: History Captured in Repoussé" to Archives staff in June.

The staff of the Artistic Property Commission worked closely with First Lady Dawn Moore to curate and exhibit two short-term displays in honor of Black History Month in February and Women's History Month in March. Staff also provided specialty tours of both exhibits.



The engine room clock from the USS Maryland Armored Cruiser - ACR 8 [MSA SC 1545-3507], which was donated to the state in 2019 by Ward Anderson, Captain, USNR (retired), was installed in June. In the spring, Stephen J. Sieracki of Stephen's Clocks provided conservation treatment and repair services to the clock. A new custom exhibit case was built by James Adajian. The panel to the right of the clock was also updated to reflect the latest information on the clock and the USS Maryland silver service.



The official portrait of Chief Judge Joseph M. Getty, by Maryland artist Scott Woolever, was transferred from the Maryland Judiciary to the Artistic Property Commission on May 6, 2024. [MSA SC 1545-3581]. This is the first piece of art by Woolever to be added to the collection.



During FY2024, the staff of the Artistic Property Commission supported several joint agency initiatives. Ongoing throughout the year, staff have been working collaboratively on the creation of a new wayfinding sign plan for the State House grounds as well as new exhibits in the Old Treasury Building in partnership with the Department of General Services (DGS), the Maryland Historical Trust (MHT) and C&G Design firm. Additionally, as DGS has worked to systematically remove, restore, and replace windows in the State House, Artistic Property staff have deinstalled, stored, and reinstalled the collections in numerous rooms to ensure their safekeeping during this project.

At the end of the fiscal year, Artistic Property staff, in conjunction with DGS and the Maryland State Arts Council, conducted research and developed a proposal for the Monument to Honor Black Patriots who served in the Revolutionary War.

ASSISTANT STATE ARCHIVIST FOR INFORMATION, APPRAISAL, AND DIGITIZATION



In October 2022, the position of Assistant State Archivist for Information, Appraisal, and Digitization was authorized.

Under the Assistant State Archivist for Information, Appraisal, and Digitization are three main units: Appraisal and Description; Constituent and Interagency Services; and Digital Acquisition, Processing, and Publication.

APPRAISAL AND DESCRIPTION

In 1985, Appraisal and Description first organized under the name, State and Local Records. Later, it reformed as Records Appraisal and Preservation, then as Appraisal and Preservation, before restructuring under its present name in 1999. Appraisal and Description was placed under the Deputy State Archivist in October 2015, and transferred to Information, Appraisal, and Digitization in October 2022. The Appraisal and Description Department evaluates state, county and municipal records to determine their value for future agency operations and administrative, legal, and historical purposes. Records in the custody of the State Archives are received, processed, and described by the Department. This involves maintaining finding aids and updating record locations, descriptions, and inventories, and continually adding entries for newly transferred records.

Records Retention & Disposition Schedules

The Department helps government agencies manage their records, particularly in the record scheduling and disposal process. A records retention and disposition schedule gives agencies the authority to transfer to the State Archives those records of permanent value that are no longer needed for daily work or to destroy records that have no further use. In Maryland, no government record may be destroyed without the approval of the State Archivist. The Department advises agencies on the creation of records retention and disposition schedules, reviews and evaluates schedule drafts, and makes recommendations to the State Archivist on whether to approve those drafts. This advisory role is fulfilled in consultation with the Records Management Division of the Department of General Services, which is responsible for coordinating the state's records management program. In FY2024, the State Archivist approved 52 records retention and disposition schedules.

Efficient records management requires the prompt and orderly destruction of records that have met their retention requirements and have been approved for disposal by the State Archivist. Upon the destruction of government records, agencies must submit to the State Archives disposal certificates documenting the destruction in accordance with Code State Government Article, sec. 10-616. The Department checks these disposal certificates against the applicable records retention and disposition schedules in order to alert agencies to any unauthorized destruction. During FY2024, the State Archivist received 1118 records disposal certificates.

Records Transfer & Space Management

During FY2024, the Archives took on permanent government record transfers of 151 record series from 43 government agencies, representing the following volume:

CONSTITUENT & INTERAGENCY SERVICES

Formed in December 2010, Constituent and Interagency Services was placed under Digital Acquisition, Processing, and Publication in January 2014. When that department was reformed as Records and Access, Constituent and Interagency Services was made a separate department.

This office operates the Archives' Help Desk. The department handles requests from the public for copies of records, fulfills government agency requests for files, and refiles records returned to the Archives. The Help Desk also provides customer support for online Maryland land records found on mdlandrec.net and plats.net. During FY2024 staff fielded 9,230 inquiries from the public relating to mdlandrec.net and plats.net. Additionally, they fielded 7,707 other inquiries

relating to Archives records or services. Staff from this office refiled and processed 8,839 individual file requests from state and local agencies and refiled over 6,857 files returned by agencies in their assigned locations within the Archives. Constituent and Interagency Services staff provided copies of 4,451 files to the public. These ranged from single-page birth, death, and marriage records, to multi-page civil, equity, and divorce decrees, to copies of entire case files which often run to hundreds of pages each.

Department staff also processed 699 Expungement Orders and received 1397 criminal background checks for various federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies.

DIGITAL ACQUISITION, PROCESSING, & PUBLICATIONS

Digital Acquisition, Processing and Publication originated as Appraisal and Preservation. When appraisal functions were assigned to Appraisal and Description, Acquisition and Preservation Services formed in May 1999. It was restructured as Acquisition and Imaging Services in August 2003 and was renamed Digital Imaging and Acquisition in June 2005. The department was further reorganized as Digital Acquisition, Processing, and Publication in August 2007, and was placed under the Deputy State Archivist in October 2015.

The digital preservation and imaging services offered by the Archives are managed, coordinated, and promoted by the Digital Acquisition, Processing, and Publication Department. This department gives technical support for imaging projects and develops standards and techniques used in such work.

In FY2024 the Archives generated 1,938,176 images from both paper and microfilm sources.

ASSISTANT STATE ARCHIVIST FOR REFERENCE, RESEARCH, SPECIAL COLLECTIONS AND CONSERVATION



In October 2022, the position of Assistant State Archivist for Reference, Research, Special Collections and Conservation was created.

Under the Assistant State Archivist are three main units: Reference Services; Research, Education, and Outreach; and Special Collections, Conservation, and Library Services.

REFERENCE SERVICES

Reference Services began as a vital department designed to serve the public when the Hall of Records building first opened on the campus of St. John's College in 1935. The Department reformed in May 2007 as Reference and Records Services and became Reference Services again in 2009. It was placed under the Deputy State Archivist in October 2015 and joined Research, Education, Outreach, and Reference Services in August 2018.

Records are made accessible to the public and government agencies through the Search Room, by mail or telephone, and through electronic media. Reference Services oversees the Search Room and is responsible for the Mail Program, Publication Rights, and Records Services.

Open Tuesday through Friday and the first Saturday of the month, the Search Room is staffed by professional archivists to assist patrons. Electronic and mail reference services are available Monday through Friday. In addition, electronic services and information, including comprehensive catalogs of the Archives' holdings, are accessible through the Archives' website.

During FY2024, Reference staff completed 4,666 orders, including 2,887 certified vital records, 3,838 uncertified vital records, and over 1,000 in-depth research requests. Of over 3,100 in-person visits, 601 were in-depth research appointments. Reference staff sent 10,754 in-depth emails, including emails providing research advice, links to online records, appointment consultation and preparation, and uncertified record delivery.



FY2023 and FY2024

A reimagined Reference program was launched in FY2024, under which volunteers assist patrons with basic computer and genealogy questions and staff our new Genealogy Station from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The current Reference volunteer program runs Tuesdays through Fridays, and we are working on volunteer coverage for our First Saturday openings.

RESEARCH, EDUCATION, AND OUTREACH

The basic research functions of Research, Outreach, and Reference Services began with the research needed to compile the *Directory of Maryland Legislators, 1635-1789*, issued by the Hall of Records Commission in 1974, and continued with the Legislative History Project's work leading to *A Biographical Dictionary of the Maryland Legislature, 1635-1789*, sponsored by the Hall of Records Commission (vol. 1, 1979; vol. 2, 1985). Biographical research at the State Archives continued as Lectures and Training, 1987-1988, Education and Training, 1988-1989, and Education and Outreach, 1989. Organized first as Biographical Research and then as Research, it re-formed as Research and Student Outreach in 2005. In October 2015, Research was placed under the Deputy State Archivist. It reorganized as Research, Education, and Outreach in July 2016, and as Research, Education, Outreach, and Reference Services in August 2018. The Division was located under the Assistant State Archivist in 2022.

Using original documentary sources, Research, Education, and Outreach works to interpret, preserve, and improve access to Maryland history through publication, education, and outreach. The department is committed to sharing its collections, resources, and professional knowledge with the community at large. Its goal is to ensure that both long-term and new users are aware of and appreciate the treasures within the State Archives' holdings, as well as find the Archives staff knowledgeable and approachable. The overriding goal is to make the Archives accessible for everyone through timely, courteous customer service and community-based educational outreach designed to teach stakeholders how to most efficiently use our collections.

Legacy of Slavery in Maryland

The primary mission of the *Legacy of Slavery in Maryland Program* is to provide direct, searchable access to primary documents on its website (https://slavery.msa.maryland.gov), detailing the history of African Americans since Maryland's founding in 1634.

Centered around the Underground Railroad in Maryland, the almost two-decade long project has amassed an impressive collection of data concerning the names and demographics of both free and enslaved individuals and Marylanders supporting or opposing slavery. To date, the project has gathered into searchable databases nearly half a million records related to heretofore largely anonymous free and enslaved African Americans. The statistical findings of this program have been lauded, scholastically utilized, and made a part of national online Black history studies such as Enslaved.org and numerous efforts to identify the 'Georgetown 272', Africans who were sold by Georgetown University and the Maryland Jesuits into southern Louisiana in 1838.

The Archives has been mining demographic data from the Maryland Penitentiary ledgers, dating from 1811. "A Jury of One's Peers" or the Maryland Penitentiary Project, seeks to document and enter into a searchable database all of the names of those who have been incarcerated in Maryland. The primary goal of this project is to reflect upon the data and explore whether racial profiling and inequitable imprisonment of African Americans existed before the end of slavery.

This data will be joined with similar data from Maryland House of Corrections records and used to examine whether a pattern of mass imprisonment of minorities began generations ago through inequitable incarceration and criminalization of the actions of people of color.

Maryland Lynching Truth and Reconciliation Commission

In 2019, a bill was introduced by Delegate Joseline Pena-Melnyk to establish the Maryland Lynching Truth and Reconciliation Commission to conduct research on individuals who were victims of mob violence. The bill received overwhelming support in both the Senate and House of the Maryland General Assembly and was voted into law.

The Commission is an 18-member body that has representation from cultural heritage institutions across the state, including the Archives, and four public members who were selected to serve based on their expertise. Christopher Haley represents the Maryland State Archives on this Commission. The members of the Commission undertake research on lynchings that occurred between 1854 through 1933, and hold public hearings in the counties where an incident of lynching occurred.

The Archives' Legacy of Slavery in Maryland program assists the Commission in identifying records in the state's collection that document incidents of mob violence. Much of what is known to date about the lynchings that occurred in Maryland has come from local newspaper accounts that were compiled for an earlier Archives' project, *Judge Lynch's Court*, where 40 individuals who were the victims of mob violence are listed with biographical data. Since that effort, which began at the turn of the 21st century, more information has been uncovered by historians and groups such as Bryan Stevenson's Equal Justice Initiative and the Maryland Lynching Memorial Project. This statewide focus has led Archives' staff to prioritize the identification of collections that will assist the Commission in documenting incidents of racial terror violence for both digitization and research, as well as for accessibility to the public. Staff is also working to compile and archive the Commission's own records, including those research materials donated by the public regarding the history of lynchings in Maryland, making them a permanent state collection.

Finding the Maryland 400

During the Revolutionary War the Maryland 400 were part of the First Maryland Regiment, which repeatedly charged a numerically superior British force during the Battle of Brooklyn (also called the Battle of Long Island) on August 27, 1776. Led by Major Mordecai Gist, these troops sustained heavy casualties but their persistence allowed General Washington to save the American army. The heroic stand of the "Maryland 400" held back the British Army, allowing the majority of American forces to escape. (https://msamaryland400.com/) In partnership with the Maryland Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, Archives staff identify and explore the lives of those members of the First Maryland Regiment who held the line, using primary and secondary sources to reveal more about their lives, their military service, and their communities. Senior Research Archivist Owen Lourie has compiled a book from over ten years of staff research, entitled *Finding the Maryland 400*. The Archives is currently raising the funds to subsidize the cost of publishing this exhaustive work on these heroic soldiers, the first responders of the American Revolution.

Educational and Student Outreach

Educational and Student Outreach began as Educational Outreach and reformed by its current name in July 2016. In the classroom, Educational and Student Outreach provides outreach and learning opportunities for all communities of students, from middle school to graduate level. Educational partnerships and co-teaching collaborations were conducted with the Bowie State University, University of Maryland College Park, St. John's College, Washington College, and Wayne State University. In addition, the program manages and coordinates the student internship program both during the summer and throughout the academic year. The program also maintains a partnership with the Enoch Pratt Free Library and the Maryland Four Centuries project to produce a year-long series of free, online Lunch and Learn programs in which guest speakers discuss the importance of primary resources, archival research, and the preservation of Maryland's heritage.

Among the Archives' proudest ongoing efforts, its intern mentorship initiative was able to continue this year due to the financial support of institutions such as those listed above that funded the students who contributed their skills in various programs. Specifically, Archives visitors could see interns pull records and complete patron requests for mariages, births, and death certificates in Reference Services; browse century-old Maryland Penitentiary ledgers for the names of thousands of incarcerated individuals for Research; assist in scanning plats and land deeds for Imaging Services; and aid in the management of programming, data control, and web design under the IT department's wing.

Additionally, the Archives was chosen as host site for the Department of Service and Civic Innovation Maryland Corps and Service Year Program, the Moore/Miller administration's new jobs initiative to help people in their transition from school to seeking full-time employment. During the pilot year, the agency welcomed four members onto its team. The foursome worked and learned in departments across the agency for nine months alongside full-time staff who provided targeted training, professional mentoring, and general job advice. The Archives is currently selecting a new cohort of members for the Maryland Corps Service Year Program's second year.

Land Office

The roots of the Land Office date back to the seventeenth century, when Lord Baltimore established the agency to administer land grants in his Maryland colony.

All land now included within the borders of the State of Maryland was granted to Cecilius Calvert, 2nd Lord Baltimore, in 1632. In 1680, the Proprietor established a Land Office and four years later the Land Council, which was authorized to hear and determine all matters relating to land. Four years later, when Maryland became a crown colony, the Land Office closed. In 1715, after a long contest with the Governor, Council, Secretary, and General Assembly, the Lord Proprietor emerged with his rights restored and the Land Office reopened. After the Revolution the state assumed control of the Land Office, and the right to grant vacant (i.e. unclaimed) land became the responsibility of the state government (Chapter 15, Acts of Feb. sess. 1777).

From 1781 until 1841, two land offices functioned in Maryland: a Land Office for the Western Shore and another for the Eastern Shore. The Constitution of 1851 created the Office of the Commissioner of the Land Office. The Hall of Records became responsible for the functions of the Land Office and its collections in 1965. By constitutional amendment, the office of Commissioner of the Land Office was abolished in 1966 (Chapter 489, Acts of 1966, ratified Nov. 8, 1966). Functions and responsibilities of the Commissioner were then transferred to the Hall of Records on January 25, 1967 (Chapter 488, Acts of 1966). The Records Management Division (then a part of the Hall of Records) took charge of recording and filing plats. When the Division was separated from the Hall of Records in 1975, plats and other Land Office records became the responsibility of the Hall of Records and, after its formation in 1984, the State Archives.

Designated Commissioner of Land Patents in 1967, the State Archivist is responsible for issuing land patents and certificates of reservation and for conducting court hearings (Chapter 355, Acts of 1967). Prior to 1967, the Land Office was a separate agency. In performing Land Office duties, the State Archivist acts independently of the duties imposed as State Archivist (Code Real Property Article, secs. 13-101 through 13-504).

The Archives did not receive any land patent applications or certificate of reservation applications in FY2024.

SPECIAL COLLECTIONS, CONSERVATION & LIBRARY SERVICES

In 1935, Special Collections, Conservation, and Library Services started as the Gift Collection and reorganized as Special Collections in 1986. In March 2005, Special Collections was placed under Artistic Property, Preservation, and Public Outreach (now Artistic Property & Exhibits). In December 2014, Special Collections returned to being a separate department. In October 2015, the department was placed under the Deputy State Archivist and, in December 2016, Conservation and Preservation merged with Special Collections to form Special Collections and Conservation. In March 2022, the Library, renamed Library Services, transferred from Government Information Services to Special Collections and Conservation, and reformed the department as Special Collections, Conservation, and Library Services.

Special Collections

Special Collections supervises the care, preservation, accessioning, and description of private records. Usually, these are given to the State Archives by private donors and generally consist of newspapers, religious records, maps, photographs, personal letters, diaries, architectural plans, and other manuscript documents. Maps in the Archives collection, for example, date from 1565 to the present. They serve as an important resource for scientists, historians, and citizens interested in the Chesapeake watershed. Photographs illustrate a cross section of Maryland life and culture, including agriculture, architecture, family life, government, nautical and naval affairs, recreation, and sports. In addition, the State Archives has microfilmed records of nearly 700 religious institutions of various denominations, and more than 900 newspaper titles from across the State.

With the exception of the State-owned art collection, the Senior Director of Special Collections, Conservation, and Library Services in conjunction with the State Archivist, reviews offers of materials as gifts to Special Collections, Conservation, and Library Services. (Offers of gifts of fine arts are reviewed by the Curator of Artistic Property and the State Archivist.) Materials are accepted on the basis of their relevance to the holdings of the State Archives, their condition, and the need to provide for their proper storage and care. Materials may be placed on deposit if their contents are to be digitized as a reference collection at the State Archives, and the original materials returned to the owner.

During FY2024, the Special Collections department completed the backlog of physical collections processing that had accumulated during the Covid pandemic. The current focus is to process and provide public access to recent donations. These efforts have benefited from the work of field study students, volunteer student interns, and members of the Year of Service program hosted by the Department of Service and Civic Innovation. In addition to a constant stream of physical collections from donors, a marked increase in digital donations since 2019, particularly of audio-visual recordings, has been observed. In FY2025, the Special Collections team will also target cataloging and access for digital donations to address the accumulation of born-digital records donated over the past five years.

In the autumn of 2023, the department oversaw the transfer of 326 boxes of personal papers, audio-visual recordings, blueprints, and other records from Southern Maryland policymaker Gary V. Hodge, with assistance from archivists from other departments. Mr. Hodge's records span his career from the 1980s to almost the present. The MSA SC 6389 collection contains correspondence relating to Mr. Hodge's major accomplishments in policy, planning, and economic development in Charles, Calvert, and St. Mary's counties. Maria Day oversaw the records transfers and logistics, while Camille DiMarco organized the rehousing of all of the records from their original boxes and storage tubs and created box-level catalog descriptions. The Hodge Collection will need further processing to make the papers publically available, but the team has created a basic inventory to ensure immediate access to the materials.

Megan Craynon and Camille DiMarco, with the help of interns and Year of Service members, have processed half of the oversized architectural drawings donated by the family of architect Bryden Hyde, MSA SC 5414-23. Mr. Hyde was an architect in partnership with James R. Edmunds, Jr. Their body of work includes plans for public buildings, schools, and hospitals, in addition to work in historic preservation and residential homes. The sizable donation from Hyde's estate arrived at the Archives in 235 metal tubes which were unsuitable for long-term

storage and access. Our team worked systematically to rehouse and catalog the drawings, with only 76 tubes of drawings left to be processed. The collection will be available for access by researchers by the end of December 2024.



Collaboration with communities to aid them in preserving their stories continues to be a significant aspect of our collection development. The Archives' partnership with the Venice Beach Citizens Association, located on Annapolis Neck, blossomed in FY2024. In addition to processing the Association's papers, the community members worked with us to donate personal photographs and to record oral histories. Work on these materials is in process, and several volunteer interns have been assisting with cataloging, rehousing and digitization. The team is also supporting the Annual Father's Day Foundation's project to record the experiences of Black community elders from the Broadneck Peninsula, with a volunteer editing Al-generated transcriptions from these audio recordings. In FY2025, the Archives anticipates additional partnership opportunities with communities invested in

preserving their histories, including the Friends of Crownsville Hospital and the community near The Harlem Theater in Baltimore.



In FY2024, Special Collections archivists successfully expanded the Archives' relationships with Indigenous Tribes on the Eastern Shore through the generous support of a grant from Maryland Heritage Areas Authority. Our project consultant and oral historian, Drew Shuptar-Rayvis of the Pocomoke Indian Nation, conducted field work and recorded interviews throughout the past year. Mr. Shupar-Rayvis' personal connections with tribes on the Eastern Shore helped him in obtaining interviews with Indigenous community members, who were offered honoraria for their time through the grant. The resulting 20 audio recordings represent a variety of Eastern Shore perspectives from the Nause-Waiwash Band of Indians, Pocomoke Indian Nation, Nanticoke Indian Tribe. Accohannock Tribe, and from a lifelong Eastern Shore resident enrolled in the Houma Nation of Louisiana. The successful efforts of Mr. Shuptar-Rayvis and our team have led to the donation of double the number of recordings we had anticipated when proposing the grant.

Preserving Indigenous voices – and, in particular, making the audio recordings accessible to educators and cultural heritage organizations – will have an enduring impact on public understanding of Indigenous traditions and lifeways. These are cultures that are thriving among us, even while Elders recall memories of traditions now in the past. Planning is underway to debut the first group of interviews and a new Oral Histories section of the Mayis Indigenous Records website in the late summer of 2024.

Changes in school curricula are driving a need for social studies teachers to develop a greater understanding of Indigenous cultures of the Chesapeake region so they in turn can educate students. The expansion of the Mayis Indigenous Records website, fueled by the grant funding, has enabled the Archives to provide professional development to K12 educators both on the Eastern Shore and statewide. Following on the highly successful pilot training program for educators in August 2023, our team gave presentations on primary resources and the Mayis website to teachers in Baltimore City and to the Maryland Council for Social Studies. More invitations to present are anticipated, as we have continued to partner with the Coordinator of Social Studies at the Maryland Department of Education. Additionally, the K12 teachers in our 2023 pilot program developed six lesson plans about Tribal Peoples on the Eastern Shore for a variety of grade levels. Working with colleagues at Maryland Humanities, these lesson plans will be incorporated into a new set of Indigenous Inquiry Kits for classroom use during FY2025. Maryland Humanities funded our tribal partners as consultants to review the lesson plans for accuracy and authentic representation of their cultures. Collaborations built with Indigenous communities, Maryland Humanities, and the Maryland State Department of Education, will increase the number of teachers aware of the Archives' resources on Indigenous cultures and histories.

While the grant funding from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority has concluded, Special Collections will continue to partner with tribes and Indigenous peoples in Maryland to preserve their cultural heritage, using the Mayis website as a platform.

Conservation & Preservation

the founding of the Hall of Records to the present day, the State Archives has been conserving and preserving Maryland's records. In the Old Hall of Records building, the work began in 1935 in the Repair Room, which re-formed as the Preservation and Repair Department in 1940, became the Repair and Preservation Department by 1945, and reorganized as the Repair and Binding Department in 1956. Then, from 1975 to 1990, it was known as the Conservation Department. In 1990, the Department was renamed Preservation and Conservation, and by 1995 had reorganized as Conservation. In 1998, as Conservation, Restoration, and Preservation Services, it was placed under Artistic Property, Preservation, and Public Outreach. Renamed Preservation Services in 2001, it re-formed as a separate department under its present name in February 2014, and was placed under the Deputy State Archivist in October 2015. In January 2017, the department became part of the Department of Special Collections and Conservation.



Conservation & Preservation preserves and cares for archival records, maintains their physical integrity, and assures their longevity and accessibility. Moreover, it provides condition assessments and performs conservation treatments needed to prepare damaged materials for scanning, patron access, and exhibition. Conservation and Preservation works closely with other Archives departments to achieve the goal of long-term access to records. This is especially true in working with the Digital Acquisition, Processing and Publication Department to enable them to produce the best scanned images in keeping with national best practices. These procedures help individuals who are not able to use originals at the Archives and they preserve the informational value of fragile manuscripts, maps, newspapers, and photographs.

The conservation team is engaged in an on-going effort to create Tyvek wrap-around covers for government record volumes that have deteriorating leather covers that are flaking with age. This condition, often referred to as "red rot," makes it difficult and messy for Reference staff and patrons to handle the volumes. Old labels can easily fall off these covers, making it difficult for our staff to locate the requested volume. The tyvek is a neutral, protective covering around the volume to which a new label is affixed. Book Conservator Camille DiMarco and Year of Service members and interns have worked on this effort throughout FY2024, and will continue to wrap volumes identified by Appraisal staff in FY2025.

After the systematic reassessment of storage conditions in the Archives' Map Room in the summer of 2023, the collection care project managed by Camille DiMarco is targeting specific sets of rolled documents (typically land surveys, maps, or architectural drawings) in need of improved housing and labeling. Last year's collection survey found that drawings were moved into shelf locations without proper identification in some cases. Archivists and interns are identifying these items and ensuring that cataloging is accurate before rolling them in neutral



material such as Tyvek and labeling them for Reference access. Ms. DiMarco has also identified a number of other collections that can be rehoused more efficiently. This collections care project is currently focused on rehousing Governor William Donald Schafer's gift collections of artwork, posters, and memorabilia. Interns and Year of Service members have been assisting staff in updating item descriptions and consolidating storage locations to clear space for more collections storage in Annapolis.

Conservation Laboratory

The Conservation Laboratory preserves the physical integrity of archival material in many forms, including manuscript papers and record books, microfilm, microfiche, photographs, published books, government publications, maps, and newspapers. The conservators monitor environmental conditions in temperature and humidity controlled storage areas and warehouses. When appropriate, conservation measures are used, including de-acidification and chelating, repair and restoration, polyester encapsulation, phased and other enclosures, and book conservation.

Preservation Outreach

The Archives participated in the work of the Maryland Task Force to Initiate Preservation Planning in the 1990s and assumed a leading role in promoting preservation to agencies, organizations, and individuals across the state. At that time, the Task Force designated the Archives to coordinate public information, workshops, and low-cost conservation services. Today, these efforts continue through lectures, workshops, and webinars given around the state, the country and online. Conservators provide preservation assessments to state and local agencies and historical groups on individual items or groups of materials as the need arises. The goal is to ensure preservation of significant collections of books and documents in Maryland government offices, libraries, museums, historical societies, private organizations and private homes.

Archives' conservators continue to provide services to state agencies and community organizations to ensure preservation of books and paper documents that are significant to the state's heritage. Conservator Camille DiMarco assisted both the Thurgood Marshall Law Library and Clerk's Office of the Supreme Court of Maryland with collections care projects during FY2024. The Law Library approached the Conservation team with a funded project to fabricate protective enclosures for 37 rare books. The Clerk of the Supreme Court requested repair for the signature pages and covers of a historic Clerk's Bible signed by a number of his predecessors. Ms. DiMarco received a follow-up project to create a custom display box enclosure for the Court's gavel, needed prior to a special session of the Supreme Court in St. Mary's County where the gavel originally came into the Court's possession.

The archivist of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge in Baltimore discovered a document rolled inside a metal tube at Lodge 38, and determined that a professional conservator needed to be consulted before removing the fragile paper. What was originally thought to be one charter document from 1912, turned out to be two documents: the original charter and a 1983 re-issue of the charter, both significantly torn and in need of conservation. Paper Conservator Jennifer Cruickshank introduced some humidity and gently flattened the brittle papers over several months. She is now engaged in repairing the split edges and tears with wheat starch paste and a lining, followed by in-filling areas of loss in the document to make the text more legible. The charters should be returned to the Lodge by the end of summer 2024, along with high resolution digital images to be used both by the Masons and the general public with an interest in African American history and culture.

Government Publications, Reports, & Library

Special Collections and Library Services oversees Government Reports and Publications and the State Archives Library. Materials under these divisions are used by and serve the research needs of Archives staff, Maryland government agencies, and the public. Print materials must be used in the State Archives Search Room, though some digital materials are freely available on the Internet.

Government Publications & Reports

The earliest state reports and publications trace to the 17th century, with the majority dating from the early 19th century to the present. They range from state constitutions, laws, and regulations to the reports of study commissions, task forces, and work groups, and include

regular annual reports of major departments as well as unique studies or reports mandated by the General Assembly. Local government material also forms an important part of our holdings.

These state and local government reports and publications are made available for research at the State Archives in various formats, and whenever possible in electronic form through a dedicated online catalog.

Government Reports and Publications accessioned in FY2024 include 815 in print and 483 in electronic format. These accession statistics reflect the work priority of the fiscal year to accession a backlog of print material. Processes have been adjusted in recognition of material flows into the Archives, in such a way as to prevent a substantive backlog accumulating in the future.

The electronic format accessions statistic represents an informal flow of material to the State Archives. The reality of digital information production and publication, at every level of government, makes it difficult to estimate what the future of electronic accessions will be.

The Director of Library Services plans to continue dialogue in FY2025, both internally and externally, to consider how the Archives can collaboratively move toward a more regularized ingest of Government Reports and Publications. Continued partnerships with the Department of Legislative Services Library and the Thurgood Marshall State Law Library will be integral to this effort. Members of these sister agencies met twice in FY2024. Continued and regular dialogue is planned to ensure effective partnership between these agencies around the shared concerns regarding government reports and publications and their availability to the public.

Library

Though present from the formation of the Hall of Records in 1935, the State Archives Library was organized formally in 1940, and made part of Government Information Services in 1995. In March 2022, the Library was renamed Library Services, and transferred to Special Collections and Conservation.

In FY2024 the Library cataloged 195 items, 132 of which were a special project donation co-managed as a Special Collection.

FY2024 accessioning statistics represent a massive shift in the operations of the Library. A challenging budget year, and other resourcing issues, led to a redirection in the work of the Library during the fiscal year. While past years have seen a substantive review of library holdings and subsequent book orders to fill the identified gaps, the budgetary constraints of FY2024 required a shift away from the annual book order toward a reliance on the donation of incoming material. This, hopefully temporary, paradigm shift in the Library's workflow, while producing a gap in Library accessions, has also created an opportunity for staff to focus on legacy projects.

Over the last year, Librarian Christine Alvey and longtime volunteer Betty Gosnell completed a project to transfer to archival boxes in the stacks those periodicals that the Archives no longer receives and which staff and researchers rarely utilize. This project was a substantial investment

of time to plan and execute, with the net result being the alleviation of pressure on limited library shelf space while continuing to provide access to these publications.

For FY2025, continued effort will be made to identify and address legacy projects, similar to the completed periodicals reshelving effort. The main goals remain to:

1) Maintain the library – This requires the cataloging of occasional incoming material, shelf reads of existing bookcases to ensure materials remain accessible to staff and researchers, and occasional book repair/relabeling in collaboration with the Conservation staff.

2) Resolve legacy issues– This includes researching books listed as not on shelf, and assessing boxes of non-accessioned materials in the stacks, to better note or determine their disposition.

GOVERNMENT INFORMATION SERVICES

Organized within the State Archives in 1986, Government Information Services provides Marylanders and their agencies of government with current and historical government information, continuously updated and revised. Through the *Maryland Manual On-Line*, Government Information Services shows the form of the government that we as Maryland citizens have created. That government is a dynamic, ever-changing resource with which to address significant public issues, and solve or resolve common public problems. Government Information Services is responsible for the *Maryland Manual On-Line: A Guide to Maryland & Its Government*. Monitoring many sources and conducting research in the public records, government publications, reports, and published materials of Maryland, the department offers a unique asset to Maryland citizens, government officials, and students of Maryland history and government.

Much of the descriptive work of Government Information Services originated with the Historical Records Survey in Maryland, begun in February 1936 as part of the Federal Writers Project. An independent unit of Federal Project No. 1, the Survey became a State project in September 1939, officially sponsored by the Hall of Records Commission. Describing the first inventory of county records, published by the Survey in 1937, James A. Robertson, Maryland's first State Archivist, noted that the manuscript materials report ". . . from which one can deduce the functions of those offices . . . is also the first survey of much that exists in the county aside from government. It shows both the form of government of the county, and something of the development of that government, as well as something of the history of the county in its various ramifications." For Maryland citizens and public officials, Government Information Services continues to describe these governmental functions and their historical evolution.

Origins of Government Information Services began in 1948, when the Board of Public Works authorized a department of information to be created under the Hall of Records Commission. That same year, the Governor asked the Hall of Records to assume responsibility for compiling, editing, and distributing the *Maryland Manual*. Over time, information from that department of information found its way into the *Maryland Manual*.

In 1988, the Governor also asked the State Archives to assemble certain governmental information, particularly agency organizational charts, for the executive branch of government.

Thereafter, for the Governor, the State Archives annually prepared the *Organization of Maryland State Government* each year from 1988 to 1995. The compilation included organizational structure, organizational charts, budgets, historical evolution, and mandated reports of government agencies. In 1989, it began to be incorporated into the *Maryland Manual*, and expanded to cover the legislative and judicial branches of government as well.

Maryland Manual On-Line

Today, the *Maryland Manual On-Line* is a continuously updated guide to Maryland government. It presents an overview of the organizational structure and personnel of the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of Maryland State and county governments. It also describes Maryland municipal governments. Further, the *Manual* shows government agency budgets and organizational charts, lists mandated reports, and provides the origin, historical evolution, and functions of these agencies.

Biographies of government officials are presented in the *Maryland Manual On-Line*. These describe State legislators, Constitutional officers, members of the Governor's staff, department secretaries, judges, university presidents, Maryland's congressional delegation, federal judges, and certain other federal officials of Maryland. Biographies of local elected government officials are written and updated for county executives, county council members, county commissioners, state's attorneys, sheriffs, circuit court clerks, orphans' court judges, and registers of wills. Additional information on local government (county & municipal), intercounty, interagency, and interstate and federal agencies is set forth in the *Manual*. Moreover, its contents present the State budget, the Constitution of Maryland, election returns (state & county), and historical lists of local officials. Further, the *Manual's* "Maryland at a Glance" section highlights many unique Maryland subjects, ranging from State Symbols, Maryland Historical Chronology (state & county), and Government to Arts, Sciences, and Literature.

Editions of the *Maryland Manual* from 1885 through 2006 are accessible through the *Archives of Maryland Online,* along with annual capturings since 1997 of the *Maryland Manual On-Line* website.

INFORMATION SYSTEMS MANAGEMENT

Information Systems Management began in 1989 as Computer Services and reorganized under its current name in 1997. This department oversees Electronic Archives, Information Technology Development, and Information Technology Support for the State Archives and provides software applications and tools to assist the Archives in achieving its goals. Moreover, the office helps other state agencies design and support their own network and web services.

Electronic Archives

At its September 1998 meeting, the Hall of Records Commission resolved that a program of Electronic Archives be created within the State Archives. The program coordinates and manages the development of a permanent archives of electronic records.

In accordance with the Archives' Information Technology Master Plan, Information Systems Management focuses on key initiatives to improve IT support services agency-wide, enhance the user experience for our constituency using the agency's electronic resources, and plan, develop, and implement IT initiatives for the future. To this end, the Archives continues to work towards the development of a trusted digital repository to provide long-term management of the agency's digital assets arranged within a technical and organizational framework that is efficient, secure -- and most of all -- sustainable.

BALTIMORE CITY ARCHIVES

The City Archives is the central repository for Baltimore City government records. It holds material of both permanent and non-permanent value, with non-permanent records being held for a designated time period until either recycled or destroyed. Electronic records do not fall under its management and oversight.

In 1927, the City Bureau of Archives was created as a unit of the Baltimore City Department of Legislative Reference, to which it still reports today. In the late 1930s, Historical Records Survey staff of the Federal Works Progress Administration (WPA) first began to describe, index, and organize the permanent records for enhanced access. A subsequent, comprehensive survey of all the municipal departments in the 1950s uncovered additional material.

The City's attention to its own archives has been cyclical in nature. Reduced operational funding curtailed its operations starting in the 1980s. A slow decline ensued. Through a 2009 special agreement, the Maryland State Archives began to revive and sustain the City Archives, even supplying staff there in 2010. Efforts to bring its holdings into an online catalog benefited from financial support from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission.

Under subsequent memorandums of understanding with the City, the State Archives has continued to support the administration of the City Archives. A consolidated agreement took effect on June 30, 2013, extending the State Archives' presence there until July 1, 2018. An extension was negotiated in May of 2018, which continued the current administration arrangement until June 30, 2023. A new five-year extension to June 2028 still awaits finalization.

The City Archives reports directly to the City Department of Legislative Reference. New department leadership continues to support the Archives in multiple ways. A new full-time City employee joined the staff to assist in records management duties and another part-time employee was hired recently. However, beyond these long needed staff additions, the sustained interest in our mission is most noteworthy. Regular Archives-focused management meetings occur every two weeks and are geared to problem solving, needs assessment, and long-range planning.

Record Management Activities

Nine records transfers, comprising 619 cubic feet of material, took place in FY2024. The agencies represented in the transfers include the Health Department, the Department of Housing and Community Development, the Parking Authority, and the Office of Equity and Civil Rights.

Thirty new retention schedules have been written and adopted. In addition, 13 existing retention schedules were revised in FY2024. During this same period, the City Archives destroyed 570 cubic feet of non-permanent material.

Reference Services

The City Archives continues an appointment-only schedule of three days per week, with extended evening hours once per month on the third Wednesday. The evening hours scenario was initiated in August 2023. In FY2024, the staff responded to 340 inquiries via phone and email. Additionally, the City records management officer has responded to weekly requests for records to be pulled and/or scanned, mostly for the Office of State's Attorney. The Archives has hosted 318 in-person visits for research, including many out-of-state and non-US researchers. City employees, students and teachers, family historians, and members of the public continue to make up the majority of our user base.

Processing Initiatives

The City Archives completed the processing of former Mayor Kurt L. Schmoke's administrative papers (1987-1999). Kurt Schmoke, the current President of the University of Baltimore, was Baltimore's first elected mayor of African American descent. The final series include his administrative staff's papers, photographs, and miscellaneous Office of The Mayor newsletter material.

The City Archives also finalized the processing of the records of Baltimore's Western High School. Western is the oldest operating public all-girls high school in the United States (1844), and is the third-oldest public high school in the State of Maryland. The records consist mostly of bound volumes of prospective student entrance examinations and student graduation examinations, dating from 1852 to 1898. The collection is cataloged in the *Guide to Government Records* and is fully opened to the public.

Outreach

The City Archives partnered with the non-profit Baltimore Heritage for the 2024 Bmore Unconference (also known as the Baltimore Unconference.) This annual event is geared to people who care about public history and historic preservation in and around Baltimore. Jeni Spamer represents the Archives on the organizing committee and has attended several planning meetings.

The City Archives has a long-established connection to the Maryland Center for History and Culture. Rob Schoeberlein chairs the library committee and sits on the publications committee. He also serves on the board of trustees.

Chesapeake Crossroads Gertrude Mackell DEIA in Programming Award

On November 2, Assistant State Archivist Corey Lewis was awarded the Gertrude Mackell DEIA in Programming Award by the Chesapeake Crossroads Heritage Area. This was the first year




this award was given by CCHA to recognize new programming initiatives in the Anne Arundel County heritage area that demonstrates an outstanding example of diversity, equity, accessibility, and/or inclusivity. The award is named after Ms. Gertrude Mackell, a longtime powerhouse in the Anne Arundel County preservation community and head of the Galesville Heritage Society. Ms. Mackell passed away earlier this year. Mr. Lewis was nominated for this honor by Dr. Eric Elston, Director of Diversity and Development for Telegraph Creative, in recognition for his outreach work on behalf of the Archives with the Blacks of the Chesapeake Foundation, Afrocharities, the Road to Nowhere

Project and the Wiley H. Bates Legacy Center. Mr. Lewis received the award from Dr. Tim Leahy, Chair of the Chesapeake Crossroads Board of Directors.

Baltimore Heritage, Inc., Preservation Award

On October 19, Rob Schoeberlein, Acting Baltimore City Archivist, received a 2023 Preservation Award from Baltimore Heritage, Inc., a nonprofit historic and architectural preservation



organization. The award was given in recognition of his contribution to <u>A</u> <u>Place for Memory: Baltimore's Historic Laurel Cemetery</u>, a recently released team authored book on the now defunct burial ground. Dr. Schoeberlein authored a chapter entitled "Gather around Their Sacred Remains": An Overview of the Laurel National Cemetery, which focuses upon Civil War soldier burials, but also details the 1863 recruitment of U.S. Colored Troops and the many supportive efforts of Baltimore's African American community on behalf of the men. The Laurel Cemetery (1852-1957) was founded as a nondenominational cemetery for African Americans of Baltimore. In 1958, the cemetery was leveled to make room for the development of a shopping center. More than 20,000 graves are estimated to still lie under the asphalt parking lot.

National Parks Service Network to Freedom Awards

On September 28, 2023, Director of Research, Education and Outreach Chris Haley and former Research Archivist Maya Davis each received two prestigious awards from the National Parks Service for their dedication and decades of work on the Study of the Legacy of Slavery in Maryland program. Both received the Wilbur Henry Siebert Award for pioneering work in researching and preserving the history of the Underground Railroad and in recognition of outstanding contributions to this field of knowledge. This award is named after Siebert who was



an esteemed educator and historian who published *The Underground Railroad from Slavery to Freedom* in 1898. They also received the Robert G. Stanton Award for outstanding support to the National Park Service Network to Freedom program. Mr. Haley was responsible for the application that successfully added the Archives to the Network to Freedom as a research facility over 20 years ago when the NPS program first began. The designation was awarded due to the importance of the Archives' holdings in the study of the underground railroad and individuals involved with the flight from slavery. The award's namesake, Robert G. Stanton, was the first African American to be appointed as the Director of the Park Service and served with dedication for 40 years.

For 30 years at the Archives and for 22 years with the Legacy of Slavery program, Mr. Haley has exemplified the

highest standards of research, outreach and archival practice with the goal of helping to uncover untold stories and making the primary sources and methods of documenting those stories accessible. Archives staff members recognize his contributions every day, but it is particularly appreciated when those who depend on us for these resources acknowledge his excellence as well.

Baltimore City Archives

Reference Services

The City Archives is open by appointment three days per week with extended evening hours once per month on the third Wednesday. The evening hours scenario required City approval and was initiated in July. Since the June HRC meeting the staff of two archivists have responded to 158 inquiries via phone and email and the city records management officer has responded to weekly requests for records to be retrieved and/or digitized, primarily for the Office of State's Attorney. The Archives has hosted 133 in-person visits for research, including several out-of-state researchers. City employees, students and educators, genealogists, and members of the public continue to make up the City Archives' user base.

The City Archives' social media presence was hampered in September when its Instagram account was disabled by Meta. Communication with Meta employees has yet to result in restoration of the account or an explanation of why it was taken down. However, prior to this, thirteen posts were created, with another on Facebook only to promote MSA's community archiving event. Statistics are not available for Instagram due to the account issue, but Facebook reports that our page visits and likes were up 24% over the prior period. Effort is put into creating posts linked to current events or anniversaries for relevance, and always feature BCA or State Archives' collections. The most enthusiastic responses during this period were to our Back to School post featuring the recent Western High School accession, followed by posts featuring the people at BCA, such as interns, staff, and our colleagues at the Mid-Atlantic Regional Moving Image Archive (MARMIA) and the AFRO Archives. MARMIA's Siobhan Hagan boosted BCA social media and community awareness by reaching out to WJZ and scheduling a weekday <u>"Where's Marty?" segment</u>, hosted by local TV celebrity Marty Bass, at the City Archives.



Appraisal, processing and cataloging

The City Archives received two substantial collections of photographic material, both documenting city department activities. The first, a transfer from the University of Baltimore, documents the Mayor's Office of Adventures in Fun, coordinated by Recreation and Parks staff. The unit was primarily responsible for War Memorial Plaza public entertainment activities during the 1970-1980s. A sampling of activities photographed include bike rodeos, doll shows, "Salute to Elvis" Day, frog hop contest, Fun Wagon views, hula hoop contest, hog calling contest, and the annual Turtle Derby. The second collection relates to the Baltimore Office of Arts and Promotion (BOPA). BOPA produces special events such as Artscape, the Baltimore Book Festival, sports competitions, parades, festivals, concerts, fireworks, family-oriented festivities, and holiday celebrations. Both collections have been preliminarily processed to provide immediate researcher access. Additional rehousing and descriptive work will be undertaken by volunteers.

The Western High School material processing, which was announced at the Spring HRC meeting, continues. All the material has undergone micro-vacuuming and a preliminary inventory document has been completed. Limited reboxing and conservation work, as well as entering the inventory in Guide, still remains. Western is the oldest operating public all-girls high school in the United States and is the third-oldest public high school in the state of Maryland. The records consist primarily of bound volumes of prospective student entrance examinations and student graduation examinations, dating from 1852 to 1898.

While smaller, select special collections have been processed, emphasis has been on correcting and improving existing collection descriptions as well as planning for future priorities. This work is often motivated by research inquiries and records requests, wherein staff notes errors or inconsistencies and takes the initiative to update descriptions. Multiple processing and reprocessing proposals have been identified as potential intern projects.

Volunteers and interns routinely assist the Archives with general processing and cataloging, with volunteers contributing many hours of work. Laura Swangin, an MLIS student, worked with us as a temporary staff member as part of the MSA Summer Intern Program. Her project created a much needed consolidated guide to all of our city reports for the ease of researcher/staff access and to identify digitization gaps and items for conservation.

We also hosted a Baltimore City summer intern provided by the Office of the Mayor's YouthWorks program. Kymora Jones digitized a selection of photographs from the Recreation and Parks Department, Arts and Crafts Division, depicting 1960s-1970s activities at recreation centers and playgrounds.

Volunteer focus has in general been on processing small collections and improving description to allow for better access to existing collections. Donna Hollie's work is a case in point and deserves mention. Dr. Hollie has been working to transcribe the 1868 Police Census (BRG11-9), a partial census of the city, that includes some unusual data, such as listing the religion of the dwelling occupants. Her work will prove valuable to social historians and genealogists since no 1870 US Census for Baltimore, indeed for any of Maryland, survives.

Digital access and technology

The project to update BCA's website has progressed, with a test series being recently transferred to the current access system. State Archives' IT staff continue to work with BCA staff to refine other fixes to the BCA collections' catalog display.

Outreach

The City Archives partnered with the non-profit Baltimore Heritage for the 2023 Bmore Unconference (also known as the Baltimore Unconference.) This annual event focuses on public history and historic preservation in and around Baltimore. Jeni Spamer represents the Archives on the organizing committee and attended and worked at the September 22 event.

Records Management Program

Gerald A. Roberts, City Records Management Officer. The Department of Housing and Community Development retention schedule review mentioned in the previous Commission report has been tabled. A total of ten revised or new retention schedules have been produced since the Spring HRC meeting.

Contact took place with the following City departments or offices: Fire, Housing and Community Development, Equity and Civil Rights, Police Accountability Board, Parking Authority, Health, Zoning Appeals, Human Resources, Retirement System, Public Works, and the Office of the State's Attorney. Numerous interactions, either in-person meetings or conference calls, have occurred since the beginning of June.

Four records transfers, comprising 305 cubic feet of material, occurred. The agencies represented in the transfers include the Health Department, the Department of Housing and Community Development and the Parking Authority. During this period, 173 cubic feet of non-permanent material from the Environment Control Board was sent out for shredding.

The City's Department of Legislative Reference has budgeted for one additional position to join the staff of the Baltimore City Archives to serve as an assistant to the Records Management Officer and other staff as appropriate. A position description has been approved and a vacancy announcement written. The job should be advertised sometime in December.

Facility

With the City's lease renewal anticipated later this Fall, multiple repairs and improvements have occurred to the building with more planned. The landlord will be vacating the offices adjacent to our research area, and the City intends to extend its leased area to allow for additional potential workspaces and/or staging areas.

The State Archives, which manages the facility's network connection and computer workstations, has scheduled re-cabling of the space, allowing for both aesthetic and performance improvements. This work should be completed by the end of December.

Commission on Artistic Property

The traveling exhibition *Treasures of State: Maryland's Art Collection* opened on June 22, 2023 with a total of sixty works of art from the state-owned art collection and thirty



from the collection of the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts. It was refreshing to see, for the first time, many of these works of art in a true museum setting rather than in a state building in the legislative complex, and provided the public an opportunity to see works that rarely leave Annapolis. An illustrated catalog (44 pages) highlighting the major narrative themes was edited by Mimi Calver and designed by Michelle Danoff (Graphics by Design). The opening reception for special guests and members was well received and was attended by 100 people including Chairman Mark B. Letzer and former chairman Matthew Lalumia. Elaine and Chris provided training to the docents at the museum highlighting the treasures from our collection. The exhibition ended the week of October 23, with over 5200 visitors having attended.



Accessions/Gifts/Transfers Highlights

The official portraits of Governor Martin O'Malley and First Lady Judge Catherine Curran O'Malley were unveiled on July 19, 2023 and accessioned into the state-owned art collection.



Susan Nininger (Executrix of Richard Adams Nininger Estate) donated 17 works of art by Florence & Kate Mackubin. Florence Mackubin has the distinction of painting the most gubernatorial portraits in the state-owned art collection. Although less prominent, Kate Mackubin was equally as talented as her sister. The works of art include one oil painting, two watercolors, three miniatures, four sketchbooks and seven pastels.

New Curator of Artistic Property, Robin Gower

The Commission on Artistic Property has welcomed Robin Gower as curator. Ms. Gower started her new position on October 18, 2023. She holds a B.A. in Anthropology concentrating in Archaeology from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and an M.A. in Museum Studies from Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis. Prior to joining the Archives staff, she worked as the curator of collections for Historic Annapolis. She has also worked for the Baltimore Museum of Industry and the National Park Service.

Old Treasury Building Interpretive Exhibits

Progress is being made in the design development phase of the project and it also looks favorable that funds will be available to move into the design implementation phase.

Constituent and Interagency Services

Constituent and Interagency Services operates the Archives' Help Desk and handles requests for copies of records. For government agencies, it fulfills requests for files and refiles records returned to the Archives. The Help Desk also provides customer support for online Maryland land records. Since the last HRC meeting in June, staff have fielded 2,299 inquiries from the public relating to mdlandrec.net and plats.net. Additionally, they fielded 1,842 other inquiries relating to Archives records or services. Staff from this office processed 896 individual file returns by State and local agencies, and have refiled over 1,703 records so far this fiscal year. For the public,1,536 requests for records were completed. These ranged from single-page birth, death, divorce, and marriage records, to multi-page civil and equity documents, to copies of entire case files often running to hundreds of pages each. Our Criminal Research team also completed over 340 criminal background checks for various federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies.

Digital Acquisition, Processing and Publication (DAPP)

Production Overview

From January to September this year, the Digital Acquisition, Processing and Publication Department generated over 3.4 million images (2,227,342 from microfilm and 1,207,062 from traditional paper sources). Over 20 record series have been placed online for free public access with over 30 additional series currently in the process of being prepared for public access.

New DT Titan Camera System



In August, the Archives acquired a new overhead camera system for use at our Rolling Run facility. This camera system, the DT Titan, is the first of its kind to capture objects of up to 40"x 60" in size. The system will allow our staff to digitize the majority of our larger framed artwork, and gives the Archives the ability to digitize our object collections to the highest standards. The Capture One software makes the capture and editing process of

images very intuitive and user friendly. The system will allow the Archives to be a digitization resource for organizations that struggled with digitizing oversize objects in the past.

Maryland State Paper Scanning Project (Rainbow Book Project)

As reported at the last meeting of the HRC, the Archives has been contracted to digitize and make available online a variety of record series covering the colonial and Revolutionary War eras. Known as the Rainbow Book Collection, these records comprise several individual collections which have been organized by topic and bound in books. Each set of books is encased in a different color binding, hence the name Rainbow Books. Staff are currently working on the Brown Book Collection (S991) and the Red Book Collection (S989), which focus on executive records related to Revolutionary War military efforts.



In coordination with the scanning project, the Research Department hosted two summer interns who created detailed inventories of the Rainbow Books so that the digital images could be searched efficiently by the general public once posted online. This project is part of the Archives' preparations and contributions to the Maryland 250 celebration, which will commemorate the semiquincentennial of the nation in 2026.

Appraisal and Description

Accessing Records in Outdated Formats

The Appraisal and Description Department is working to increase its ability to access records of permanent value that are stored in outdated formats. Once these records are accessed, staff can transition them into more stable forms of storage. One example of a new tool we are utilizing is a virtual machine - a computer system created using software that operates independently of the physical computer that created it. On this virtual machine, outdated software programs that are unavailable or unsafe for our physical computers can be used to access old files and convert them to a safer format. The Archives has also acquired equipment that allows us to access and convert old A/V formats, such as cassette and DAT tapes. This has helped us access a number of government records, as well as unique Special Collections such

as the RCWBC (Reconnecting Communities in West Baltimore Coalition) "Highway To Nowhere" collection.

CoSA/SAA 2023 Joint Conference


Staff from the Appraisal and Description Department attended the Council of State Archivists (CoSA) and Society of American Archivists (SAA) 2023 conference in Washington, D.C., collaborating with archivists from across the nation on many of the issues that we are currently investigating, including:

- Reappraising whether medical records warrant permanent retention
- Focusing on serving previously underserved communities
- Reviewing how best to document policies and decisions
- Investigating new tools for web crawling and preservation

Reference, Research, Education, and Outreach Services

Reference Services

Since the last Commission meeting through September of this year, Reference Services staff assisted over 1050 in-person patrons, retrieved 1773 original archival records, fulfilled nearly 2449 record orders, and answered 4115 in-depth reference emails. As part of the 1050 in-person visits, staff also conducted 227 research appointments, a popular option for more in-depth research projects and needs. We continue updating our research guides online to assist patrons in locating our expanding online genealogical resources.



The Archives unveiled an updated Search Room, with new tables offering over three times as much space for visitors for safer record handling and more comfortable research, as well as new complementary seating. The original archival carrels, designed by former State Archivist and Hall of Records building namesake Dr. Edward C. Papenfuse, served us well for nearly forty years, but we are pleased to have new furnishings that meet both updated accessibility standards and current archival best practices for spatial layout and security. We appreciate all of our researchers' feedback over the years which helps us identify how we can better serve our patrons.



Education and Outreach

Legacy of Slavery, Research, Education and Outreach staff have remained busy since the last meeting of the HRC, participating in numerous research, teaching, historical, and consulting efforts. Staff met with members of the Skidmore community on their endeavor to research the stories of the enslaved who lived and worked at nearby Whitehall Plantation in Annapolis. The Archives hopes to partner on a community collections project and web portal with this group in order to make their region's history more accessible.

Staff also provided guidance and recommendations to stakeholders who hope to create a figural monument to African American soldiers who fought in the American Revolution, in commemoration of the American semiquincentennial. In addition, staff provided consulting services to Visit Annapolis and Anne Arundel County Tourism on the authoring and production of a civil rights-oriented guide of sites and events for visitors. This guide will be published next year in recognition of the 60th anniversary of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.


The Archives is moving forward on the publication of a full hardcover volume based on Maryland 400 research supervised by Owen Lourie over the last 10 years in collaboration with the Maryland Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. This reference book will identify and honor the hundreds who served in the colonial era military for Maryland. This book will be published next year for the America and Maryland 250 commemoration.

The staff of the Legacy of Slavery department is contributing to numerous historical projects, such as consulting on the reinterpretation of Brice House and the renovation of City Dock. Chris Haley is providing documentation and DEIA guidance to these initiatives. The team also hosted several classes from the University of Maryland College Park, Johns Hopkins University, Stevenson University and Washington College for co-teaching opportunities.



The 2023 Summer Internship program ran from May 31 through August 9. Nineteen students from 10 schools completed substantive work on numerous projects: mining and entering data on 17th-century runaway and domestic traffic ads; appraising and assessing the Rainbow Books series of records pertaining to early Maryland history; mining early 20th-century Maryland Penitentiary records; mining gubernatorial correspondence and records over decades for anything related to lynchings; doing hands-on work with our IT programming staff; rehousing collections with our conservators; documenting

local government for the Maryland Manual; and providing public-facing customer service for the Reference Department. To read more about our full summer program, please see the summer edition of the Archives' newsletter, *The Clamshell*.



The Archives hosted two Community Preservation Days on July 17 and October 21. The summer program was held in Annapolis while the fall program was conducted at the Rolling Run facility. Members of the local community were invited to preserve their documents, photos, and letters using digital imaging services at the Archives. During the events, archivists worked with community members to describe and scan their items, providing them with free digital copies and archival

storage containers for their original materials. These Community Preservation Days have led to the creation of the Archives' Memory Bank to save and make accessible the resulting community collections [MSA SC 6229]. Participants were asked to share digital copies of their items with the Archives to collaboratively create a permanent electronic collection that allows everyone to see themselves in the Archives. These images have been included in a publicly-accessible digital series within Special Collections to document and share community history.

Special Collections, Conservation and Library Services

Community Archiving Highlights

Special Collections Department archivists have concentrated their efforts on community archiving projects and outreach, providing consultations to nonprofit organizations on preservation and digitization projects, including the Dorchester County Historical Society, Mountain Club of Maryland, Aberdeen Historical Museum, and the Society of the War of 1812. Community collecting initiatives remain a significant priority. Our team met with members of the Venice Beach Citizens Association Collection to discuss their local preservation efforts, and in July received a donation from Jack Nelson, the record-keeper for this historic African American community in Annapolis Neck. Archivists have processed the Venice Beach collection following Mr. Nelson's original organization. The records include deeds, historical legal records, zoning and environmental records, and correspondence (MSA SC 6386). The department has supported two Memory Bank events hosted by the Archives by archiving the records that citizens brought to be digitized and shared as part of a special collection.

A grant from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority (MHAA) gave the department the opportunity to bring an Indigenous oral historian and research consultant to its team, Drew Shuptar-Rayvis, a member of the Pocomoke Indian Nation. His combined background in anthropology and personal connections within Indigenous communities enabled him to immediately begin to work with tribal councils throughout the Eastern Shore to identify Knowledge Keepers who could be interviewed for oral histories. To date, Drew has collected nine recordings from tribal members, with more scheduled in the coming weeks. Each of the interviewees receives a \$250 honorarium from the grant fund to compensate them for their time and work in sharing their perspectives. In the coming months, the audio recordings will be transcribed by a project intern. Copies and transcriptions will be submitted to each interviewee for their review and consent, prior to making these oral history recordings available on the Mayis website. Mr. Shuptar-Rayvis has received a full scholarship to the prestigious Indigenous Archival Training Program of the Society of American Archivists, which he attended in September representing the Mayis project and the Maryland State Archives.



The same grant also supported a pilot workshop aimed at connecting educators with our tribal partners, to provide teachers with direct-from-source information about Indigenous lifeways and culture. The Indigenous Education on the Lower Eastern Shore workshop ran from August 1-4, at the Edward H. Nabb Research Center, Salisbury University. A cohort of 18 educators participated, representing K-12 teachers, librarians, and museum educators, with eleven of the educators coming from the Lower Eastern Shore counties. Visiting tribal homelands was key to acquainting educators with the cultural heritage of these communities. Field trips, including interactions between tribal leaders and participants at the Chicone Village at Handsell; Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge, the Nause-Waiwash Long House, and Delmarva Discovery Museum, helped the educators to see and experience the Indigenous communities' perspectives on "Homeland." One educator wrote in their survey, "The program included total immersion, personal encounters with authentic Native Americans. These encounters will challenge your preconceived perspectives and enhance your understanding of America's history."




Many of the teachers had never visited these heritage sites before the workshop, and one of them wrote that the workshop "...exceeded my expectations with the genuine passion for the topic that translated into meaningful and high quality activities and experiences. The on-site visits and interactions with the tribal representatives made a tremendous impact on this material. All of the facilitators made me and I believe, everyone, feel valued and appreciated. One of my best weeks this summer!" Lesson plans submitted by this educator cohort will be reviewed by Archives' staff and our tribal partners and ultimately provided to teachers as an online resource on the Mayis website.

Conservation Treatment for Supreme Court of Maryland

Clerk Gregory Hilton of the Supreme Court of Maryland approached the Archives with a request for assessing the condition of the Court's Test Books. The book covering from the 1916 to 1917 volume is of particular interest to the Court for periodic display. Among the many attorneys admitted to the Maryland Bar in that time period, it contains the signature of (Justice) Thurgood Marshall. The 1916 to 1957 Test Book was also in fragile condition, with the cover spine broken and the sewing very loose. Fortunately, the text block itself was intact, though multiple layers of tape had been applied to the cover in attempts to mend it (tapes include Buckram, fiber tape and heavy cloth book tapes).

Conservator Camille DiMarco first removed the layers of exterior tape and residue on the covers with heated tools and a new cloth spine was reconstructed using parts of the original. She also stabilized and reattached the covers with the text block to improve the book's appearance as well as to increase its functionality. Spot mends were added with custom-colored Japanese tissue around the worn edges of the covers to enhance the overall appearance and strengthen the corners and edges, making them less vulnerable to additional wear and tear. Finally, a new cloth display box was created to protect and display the volume. While this extensive preservation project goes beyond the typical level of work to preserve and stabilize materials, the significance of this book to the Supreme Court and to the general public lent itself to extra attention and care.

Library

Since the last Hall of Records Commission meeting, efforts within the Library and Government Reports and Publications have centered on solving legacy challenges. Areas of focus have ranged from partnership with IT to update technical tools, addressing space management for library holdings, and tackling a backlog of cataloging work.

The Archives' extensive holdings of supporting books and periodicals have filled the space allocated to them, leading to overcrowding. To address this, librarian Christine Alvey and a volunteer assistant are working on a significant collection relocation project focused on rehousing inactive periodicals and moving them to the stacks. This relocation will allow staff access to facilitate internal research or patron assistance, but makes room for new book acquisitions.

In addition to addressing space issues, the librarian has begun to focus on accessioning the backlog of print government reports and publications which was mentioned in the last Hall of Records Commission report. Print publications have traditionally been accessioned at the end of a calendar year, but the demand of other projects has delayed this process. With the assistance

of an MLIS field study student from the University of Maryland College Park iSchool and a long-time library volunteer, the librarian is adjusting the process to both catch up on print accessioning and also allow for more real time accessioning going forward.

On September 20, Assistant State Archivist Emily Oland Squires, Librarian Christine Alvey, and Director of Special Collections & Library Services Megan Craynon hosted librarians from the Department of Legislative Services Library and the Thurgood Marshall State Law Library to begin conversations about shared concerns and priorities around both print and electronic government reports and publications. While each institution has a unique mandate and constituents they serve, they hold overlapping collections and goals. The discussion was valuable and a collective decision was made to hold a biannual meeting to continue exploring opportunities for partnership and collaboration.

Opening Remarks / Special Announcements

Chief Justice Fader remarked on a ceremony held at the Maryland Supreme Court on October 26, in which Edward Garrison Draper was posthumously admitted to the Maryland bar. Mr. Draper had applied for admission to the bar in 1857 but, though he was found to be fully qualified, was denied admission solely on the basis of his race. Chief Justice Fader thanked Comptroller Lierman for her attendance at the ceremony. He also noted the presence and participation of Governor Wes Moore, Attorney General Anthony G. Brown, House Speaker Adrienne Jones, and Chief Judge Gregory Wells, all of whom are the first people of color to hold their current positions in Maryland. Judge John G. Browning, Maryland attorney Domonique A. Flowers and José F. Anderson, a law professor at the University of Baltimore School of Law, filed a petition for Draper's posthumous admission to the bar with the state's Supreme Court in March, and were in attendance at the ceremony. Chief Justice Fader thanked the Archives' conservators for their work on a test book signed by Thurgood Marshall which was used during the ceremony.

State Archivist Elaine Rice Bachmann remarked on her participation in a civil rights bus trip hosted by the Common Power Institute, and thanked the Friends of the Maryland State Archives for funding the participation of Research Archivist Hannah Lane. She acknowledged the role of civil rights activists Charles Molden and Bernard Lafayette, as well as Brian Stevenson of the Equal Justice Initiative, in providing the bus trip participants with the context and perspective that made the experience so meaningful.

Ms. Rice Bachmann noted that the Archives will celebrate the 40th anniversary of the groundbreaking for the Edward C. Papenfuse State Archives Building. She thanked Mr. Medlock and Secretary Chaudhry for the Department of General Services' long stewardship of the building's infrastructure, and specifically acknowledged the daily contributions of DGS' on-site staff Omar Greene and Tom Dabay in keeping the building functioning smoothly.

Records Retention & Disposal

Kathryn Baringer, Director, Appraisal and Description, reported the approval of 25 retention schedules since the last meeting of the Commission, six from state agencies,14 from county agencies and five from municipalities. She also approved two for Baltimore City agencies. The Archives received 311 disposal certificates, but this number is inflated due to one agency's mistaken belief that a separate certificate for each type of record needed to be submitted.

Dr. Jones moved to approve the record retention schedules and disposal certificates, seconded by Delegate Rosenberg. The motion was unanimously approved.

State Archivist's Report

Ms. Rice Bachmann commended Assistant State Archivist Corey Lewis for his receipt of the Chesapeake Crossroads Gertrude Mackell DEIA in Programming Award. This award was given

by CCHA to recognize new programming initiatives in the Anne Arundel County heritage area that demonstrates an outstanding example of diversity, equity, accessibility, and/or inclusivity.

She also commended Director of Research, Education and Outreach Chris Haley and former Research Archivist Maya Davis for their receipt of the National Parks Service's Wilbur Henry Siebert Award for pioneering work in researching and preserving the history of the Underground Railroad and the Robert G. Stanton Award for outstanding support to the National Park Service Network to Freedom program.

She also commended Acting Baltimore City Archivist Dr. Rob Schoeberlein, who received a 2023 Preservation Award from Baltimore Heritage, Inc., in recognition of his contribution to *A Place for Memory: Baltimore's Historic Laurel Cemetery*. Dr. Schoeberlein authored a chapter entitled "*Gather around Their Sacred Remains*": An Overview of the Laurel National Cemetery".

Jeni Spamer, Deputy Archivist of the Baltimore City Archives, reported on a proposed exhibit of photographs depicting residents of neighborhoods during the slum clearances of the late 1930s. Delegate Rosenberg suggested that BCA contact Holly Arnold of the Mass Transit Administration to explore the possible collecting of materials created by current community efforts to have Baltimore's "Highway to Nowhere" demolished, as the displacement represented by the "Highway" parallels that of the slum clearances.

Chris Kintzel thanked artist Carl Harris for his donation of two of his glass etchings, *The Old Line State - Maryland State House* and *Harriet Tubman*.

Emily Oland Squires, Assistant State Archivist, thanked the Archives' education partners for their funding contributions in support of the summer internship program. St. John's College, Washington College, Bowie State University, the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority, the Maryland Institute for Innovative Computing, and the Anne Arundel and Howard County Public School Systems all contributed financially to the program. She also thanked the University of Maryland's College of Information Studies for regularly placing field study students with the Archives throughout the year.

Maria Day, Senior Director of Special Collections, Conservation, & Library Services thanked Jack Nelson, historian and record-keeper of the Venice Beach Citizen Association, for the donation of community documents.

State Archivist's Report

Budget Update

The loss of Special Funds derived from private company subscriptions to mdlandrec.net that occurred in FY24 has necessitated close planning with the Department of Budget and Management Office of Budget Analysis (OBA) to close the structural deficit on the FY25 Appropriated budget. We are also closely collaborating with OBA to project costs and expenditures into the next four fiscal years to plan for General Funds appropriation. The Archives should not rely on generating Special Funds Revenue that is subject to the fluctuating Real Estate market or any other variable beyond the control of state government in order to support the mandated core functions of this agency.

Information Technology Infrastructure Concerns and Costs

The most critical item in the budget for FY25 for which the Archives is requesting funding is the replacement of our Nutanix Server. Nutanix is our hybrid platform to support all operational database and application servers. These servers support all of the online services, including the Archives' websites (i.e. msa.maryland.gov, mdlandrec.net, plats.net, mdmanual.net, etc.), which will go offline and result in data not being processed in the event of failure. The Archives purchased two Nutanix platforms in FY18. This equipment is already six years old and its life cycle is five years (FY23). The Archives has already renewed the maintenance contract for this equipment for another year, beyond which the company does not provide service coverage due to its age. We must replace these platforms now because the hardware and software is outdated and their processing capability and storage capacity cannot meet the current requirements. If we do not replace the Nutanix system in FY24, the Archives will not have reliable, secure computing power and environment for processing electronic archives, including our public website. In addition to not being able to maintain our current services, without Nutanix Servers we also will not be able to support the Executive Paperless Government Initiative currently in planning with the Office of Governor Moore, DoIT, and DGS.

Gateway Park

Archives' staff are closely monitoring the development of a public park on the plot of land adjacent to our building that is bordered by College Creek. Part of this parcel is owned by the State of Maryland and part by the United States Navy. We understand this project to be a partnership between Anne Arundel County and the City of Annapolis to create a public space with walking/bike trails and water access. Staff has discovered through independent investigation that the project has been awarded a \$850,000 congressional grant of federal earmark funding. The State Archivist has reached out to the Secretary of the Department of

General Services and the Governor's Office to inquire about park development and potential impacts to the Archives' building and its services. In response, we have received copies of some proposed plans that include the use of the Archives' parking lot and feature possible floating docks and water taxis. Staff currently have deep concerns about security issues, the environmental envelope of our building, and facility needs and public access to our building if this park goes forward as planned, particularly if we are not included in the development process. While the general concept of a Gateway Park is a positive one, the State Archivist has asserted that any plans being developed for this contiguous property cannot negatively impact the security and preservation of the Archives collections, nor public access to these collections.

Baltimore City Archives

Staff Additions

Laura Swangin, MLIS, a 2023 Summer intern, was hired by Baltimore City in April for a new full-time permanent position. Ms. Swangin's duties as Archives and Records Management Technician will support records management activities, archives collection processing, searchroom support, and will initiate the major project of performing a shelf-read of the entire storage facility. Further staff expansion occurred in May when Margaret Marzolf joined us as a part-time City employee. Ms. Marzolf will also be supporting the shelf-read project, along with miscellaneous processing and data entry tasks. These two new employees mark the first time in more than ten years that the City Archives has had this level of staffing. We are most appreciative of this demonstration of support from the City's Department of Legislative Reference.

Reference Services

The City Archives continues an appointment-only schedule of three days per week, with extended evening hours once per month on the third Wednesday. The evening hours scenario was initiated in August 2023; most evening visitors access Maryland Vital Records on our searchroom computers. Since the November 2023 HRC meeting, the staff of two archivists have responded to 227 inquiries via phone and email, and the city records management officer has responded to weekly requests for records to be retrieved and/or digitized, primarily for the Office of State's Attorney. The Archives hosted 201 in-person visits for research, including several out-of-state researchers. City employees, students and educators, genealogists, and members of the public continue to make up our user base.

A new practice of quarterly week-long closures to public appointments was adopted in spring 2024, with the first week of closure held March 25-29. The closures allow BCA staff to focus and catch up on large or long standing administrative tasks and projects. The first week coincided with the Key Bridge collapse, so some of that time was diverted into the City/State Archives'

response. Other tasks accomplished include planning for the shelf-read project and documenting and organizing stray accessions in the work area.

Appraisal, processing and cataloging

The John L. Cain Collection, BMS 57, is now open to the public. Cain edited the local newspaper *East Baltimore Guide*, prior to his election to the Baltimore City Council for the first district in 1991. Drawn to history, he collected various manuscripts, printed materials and artifacts relating to Baltimore City, with a focus on the history of East Baltimore, Highlandtown, and Canton. His collection includes historical newspapers, business and government records, photographs (including both original slides and many *Baltimore Sun prints*), original and reprinted maps, publications, brochures, postcards, and ephemera. The initial processing was undertaken by intern Kathleen Morris in 2022, with final completion by Jeni Spamer.

The Department of Public Works Collection "Museum" series, BRG47-48, has been a focus of appraisal and processing since March. While this 84-box collection of photographs and publications had been partially described before its transfer several years ago, recent review and appraisal have brought much interesting material to light. Public Works photographers often captured Mayoral events, as well as general activities occurring in Baltimore, dating from 1958 to the 1990s. Subjects include: Mayor Theodore McKeldin, various activities (inauguration, New Year's reception, Russell Street bridge dedication, etc., 1964-65). Gwynn Oak Park (after closure/abandoned rides before auction, 1974), Hamilton business district Arts & Crafts Festival (1979-1983), Harborplace Opening (views from the water to pavilions, 1980), Howard Street business district (Stewart's, Hochschild Kohn's, Mano Schwartz, McCrory's, Read's Drugstore, pedestrian walkway, early 1970s), and Lombard Street/Corned Beef Row (1976). Rob Schoeberlein, City Archivist, is the lead on this project.

The Western High School material processing, which we announced at the Fall HRC meeting, is still ongoing. Reboxing the collection in its entirety has begun, which will be followed by adding the inventory online into the Department of Education records. Western is the oldest operating public all-girls high school in the United States and is the third-oldest public high school in the state of Maryland. The records consist mostly of bound volumes of prospective student entrance examinations, attendance records, and student graduation examinations, dating from 1852 to 1898.

Volunteers and interns routinely assist the Archives with general processing and cataloging, contributing many hours of work; we continue to receive multiple inquiries from interested volunteers. Most recently, Leah Sims, an intern from the University of Maryland College of Information Studies, completed an inventory of Mayor Kurt Schmoke's administrative staff files. While several of his correspondence series have been opened fully to researchers for years, close to 25 cubic feet of material from Schmoke's key administrative staff had not been added to our catalog, and therefore had restricted, minimal circulation. Recent researcher interest prompted this processing project. This series includes high-interest topics not found within other series, such as Schmoke's speeches, in which he advocated the decriminalization

of marijuana and promoted the perception of the drug crisis as a medical issue and not a law enforcement problem.

Ava Cohen, a senior at Berman Hebrew Academy, worked with us throughout the late winter and spring. Ava inventoried Law Department case files from the immediate post-World War II period through the 1954 *Brown vs. Board of Education* decision, to improve public access to City legal topics and documentation. The great majority of Law Department case files have not been entered into our catalog. Ava inventoried various civil rights-related cases in Baltimore, an area of great interest to researchers.

Dr. Donna Hollie continues to transcribe the 1868 Police Census (BRG11-9), a partial census of the city, that includes some unusual data, such as listing the religion of the dwelling occupants. Her work will prove valuable to social historians and genealogists since no 1870 US Census for Baltimore, indeed for any of Maryland, survives.

A new volunteer, Sonya McKenney, has been linking descriptive information from legacy inventories to the photos on our Flickr site, which until now only had a file number associated with them. This project transforms the utility of our online images.

Outreach

We hosted four class sessions at our facility during this Spring semester. Morris Speller, Lecturer at Johns Hopkins University Writing Program, brought his students as part of the *Reintroduction to Writing: Lost Baltimore* course. Its premise: How might one write the stories of neighborhoods that no longer exist? In this community-engaged writing course, the students worked at the BCA to uncover the stories of people who lived in neighborhoods demolished by the Housing Authority of Baltimore City between the 1930s and 1960s. The class focused on BRG 48-39 photographs, supplemented by city directories, Sanborn atlases, and other documents. The course culminated with a collaboration with local archives and museums, and students will research and create texts for a public exhibit on the history of Baltimore neighborhoods that have been lost to urban renewal, gentrification, and other forms of displacement.

We also hosted Professor Larry Gibson, University of Maryland School of Law, and his students for an overview of our holdings and a tour of our building. The tour is an annual event.

The City Archives has partnered again with the non-profit Baltimore Heritage for the 2024 Bmore Historic Unconference. This annual event focuses on public history and historic preservation in and around Baltimore. Jeni Spamer, Deputy City Archivist, represents the Archives on the organizing committee for this year's September 27 event.

Digital access and technology

Several hardware improvements have been implemented at the Archives since the last report. New ethernet cables and ports were installed throughout the facility, redirecting certain lines so that all led to a central location, and removing the old cables and some unused equipment. A survey of on-site hardware was completed in order to plan for technology upgrades, which have already begun. Five staff and public computers will receive new hard drives during this process, and further replacement of staff and public workstations will be planned for the next several years.

In December, we completed a restructured site map to plan for a completely overhauled website on the Baltimore City domain. Since then, the City's migration to a new web publishing platform resulted in staff being re-trained on how to build and edit sites. This training reframed the potential for site navigation structure. Our new staff additions will eventually assist in revising and migrating our web content to the new city-hosted site once the structure is finalized and created by Baltimore City IT.

The Archives received a Bookeye overhead scanner through Baltimore City, and staff attended a training on how to use it and its specialized software. This equipment allows us to digitize delicate and bound items on site, replacing some of the functionality of an older technology, the Zeutschel scanner, which is defunct.

Records Management Program (Gerald A. Roberts, City Records Management Officer) Records Management staff is involved in on-going discussions with the Department of Public Works about digitization contracts and the preservation concerns that should be addressed and planned for in current and future projects. Overall, meetings with City departments have indicated that pandemic-related pivots to digital points of service have shifted certain departmental records from paper to electronic formats for the foreseeable future. Records Management staff has done some initial research into electronic records management solutions which could potentially be integrated with the City's existing IT networks and vendors in the future, such as Preserve365. Eight appraisal visits, featuring two or three staff members, occurred since our previous report. Visits were made to the Mayor's Office of Governmental Relations, Planning Department, Police Department, Fire Department, Office of Equity and Civil Rights and the City Convention Center. Further, two consultations, by phone or virtual, took place with the Department of Housing and Department of Public Works.

The City Archives accepted five transfers totaling 314 boxes. Three transfers originated from the Department of Housing and Community Development. The other two came from the Office of Equity and Civil Rights and the Health Department.

The Parking Authority of Baltimore City reboxed 200+ boxes of material already held onsite.


In May, 500 boxes of non-permanent records from various agencies were palletized and shrink-wrapped for transport. The material is slated for destruction by a City vendor.

Commission on Artistic Property

Throughout the 2024 legislative session, staff of the Artistic Property Commission worked closely with the presiding officers, staff, and legislators to ensure the safe display and care of artwork in the state's collection. Artistic Property staff continued to facilitate the exhibit of works throughout the legislative complex.

The staff of the Artistic Property Commission worked closely with First Lady Dawn Moore to curate and exhibit two short-term displays in honor of Black History Month in February and Women's History Month in March. Staff also provided specialty tours of both exhibits.

In celebration of the 60th anniversary of the passage of the Civil Rights Act, the first exhibit featured thirteen works throughout Government House from the Maryland State Archives, the Banneker-Douglass Museum, and the Maryland Center for History and Culture. Highlighting both the themes of "art" and "civil rights" the collection of artworks on display provided a powerful exploration of those who have contributed to social justice in Maryland and beyond. The exhibit also highlighted the works of talented Black artists in the collections of these institutions.



In honor of Women's History Month, the temporary exhibit highlighted the contributions of women to the state of Maryland and beyond. It featured photographs from the Maryland Women's Hall of Fame and works from the State's art collection as well as from the Peabody Art collection.

Accessions/Gifts/Transfers Highlights

Steven Scott of Baltimore donated two watercolors by Maryland artist Jack Garver (1925-2021) and another set of Tom Miller screen prints (*Summer in Baltimore, Maryland Crab Feast,* and *The National Aquarium in Baltimore*) in memory of his graduate professor, Dr. David C. Driskell

A *Pier Mirror* [MSA SC 1545-3244] originally installed in the Government House in the 1870's is being conserved and will be returned to public display in the mansion.



The **USS Maryland** Engine Room Clock [MSA SC 1545-3507] returned from conservation and is once again keeping time. It was installed in May in the Caucus Room beside the USS Maryland silver service.

Old Treasury Building Interpretive Exhibits

Progress is being made in the design development phase of the project and it also looks favorable that funds will be available to move into the design implementation phase.

Constituent and Interagency Services

Constituent and Interagency Services operates the Archives' Help Desk and handles requests for copies of records. For government agencies, it fulfills requests for files and refiles records returned to the Archives. The Help Desk also provides customer support for online Maryland land records. Since the last HRC meeting in November 2023, staff have fielded 3510 land record-related emails and 1218 phone calls, and 452 plat-related emails and 199 phone calls from the public relating to mdlandrec.net and plats.net. Additionally, they fielded 5028 calls relating to Archives records or services. Staff from this office processed 1292 individual file returns by State and local agencies, and have refiled over 1889 records so far this fiscal year. For the public, 3250 requests for records were completed. These ranged from single-page birth, death, divorce, and marriage records, to multi-page civil and equity documents, to copies of entire case files often running to hundreds of pages each.

Digital Acquisition, Processing and Publication (DAPP)

Production Overview

Since the last meeting, the Digital Acquisition, Processing and Publication Department generated over 1.8 million images (1,294,433 from microfilm and 509,886 from traditional paper

sources). Fifty-eight record series have been placed online for free public access with over 30 additional series currently in the process of being prepared for public access.

Digital Plats Working Group Update

In 2023, the Digital Plats Work Group, which includes members of Archives, the Circuit Courts and Judicial Information Systems (JIS), the Judiciary Administration, and the Department of Assessment and Taxation, worked together to make plat filing and transfer to the Archives an entirely digital process. This change improves the efficiency with which the state receives and posts plats for public access. Additionally, this eliminates the need for the Archives to account for both digital and physical storage.

JIS has completed development of user acceptance training (UAT) in Harford County and is currently in the testing phase of the project with the county. Next, JIS will review the feedback from the UAT to make changes to the application and the integration. JIS will offer another UAT in Carroll County. After the two-week training, JIS will review all feedback and make final changes. Archives will then be notified and digital plats will go live in the counties that are ready to adopt the new process. The expectation is that additional counties will be phased in as they become comfortable with the process, with the goal being eventual full compliance by all twenty-four counties.

Baltimore City Blockchain Project

Baltimore City is attempting to use blockchain technology for the recordation of land titles, land valuation, permit tracking, and the use of smart contracts to simplify the process for purchasing vacant properties. This initiative aims to streamline the process of bringing vacant properties back into active use, particularly in neighborhoods still grappling with the consequences of redlining. In December 2023, the Board of Estimates approved a three-year pilot to record Baltimore's vacant property deeds on a blockchain, positioning Baltimore as the first municipality in the country to leverage this emerging technology to combat vacant housing.

Assistant State Archivist Corey Lewis reached out to the City Solicitor and offered our assistance. Archives staff members Frank Patnaude, James Watson and Corey Lewis met with the core project team over the course of two months (Baltimore City IT and Medici Land Governance) to provide information regarding MDLANDREC and the data we collect. At the conclusion of these meetings it was determined that this data would be beneficial to the City's project. The Archives entered into a three year MOU with Baltimore City to provide land record data in support of this project.

Maryland State Papers (Rainbow Books) Digitization Project

As reported at the last HRC meeting, the Archives has been digitizing a subset of the Maryland State Papers known as the Rainbow Books, with funding from the Society of Cincinnati. These are correspondence from the Revolutionary War up to the early 1800's. The correspondence was organized by similar topics and were bound together in color-coded books. The volumes that were targeted for this project were the Brown, Blue, and Red book collections. Every

volume in each collection is being inventoried at a document level and the documents imaged to archival standards and in color for ease of legibility. The images are then made available to the public online for free. As of today, the Brown and Blue book series have been fully digitized and are available online. Of the 51 volumes from the Red book collection, 37 have been digitized and are now available online. The balance of this collection is expected to be completed and online this summer.

War of 1812 Digitization Project

At the beginning of the year, the Digital Acquisition, Processing and Publication Department began a digitization project with the Society of the War of 1812. The Society is an association of descendants of the defenders of Baltimore during the War of 1812. The Society contacted the Archives about digitizing some of their early records with the understanding that the Society would give the material to the Archives. The material contained applications for admittance to the Society as well as letters of correspondence, newspaper clippings, and meeting minutes. As part of this project, volunteers from the Society were trained to assist with the scanning of their records. Over the course of three months, the Society digitized all of their targeted material and agreed to make these digital scans available for free public access as well.

Mountain Club of Maryland Digitization Project

The Mountain Club of Maryland is a hiking and canoeing group of volunteers who assist in the maintenance of sections of the Appalachian Trail. As the organization approached its 90th anniversary, the group contacted the Archives about a multi-phased project to digitize a variety of their records. Phase One was the digitization of a variety of their photo albums and bulletins covering the 1930s through the 1970s. Phase Two, the current phase, is the digitization of meeting minutes covering 1936-1996.

Appraisal and Description

Criminal Research

The Archives is responsible for prompt responses to requests for federal, state, and local background checks for gun ownership. During FY24, the Archives moved this criminal research function under the Appraisal Department and expanded it with an additional experienced staff member. These changes allow for a much higher rate of request completion and the elimination of backlogged requests. Now that these inquiry responses are being kept up-to-date, the criminal research team is able to turn some of their focus to improving processes and creating efficiencies. They have also taken on duties previously completed by other Archives' staff, including the expungement of Court records and the fulfillment of historic criminal record requests from patrons. The Criminal Research team received 692 criminal background checks from November through April for various federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies.

Review of Restrictions

One of the Archives' vital roles is to ensure that we abide by all applicable access restrictions for the records in our custody. This can be particularly challenging when one type of record includes a mix of non-restricted and restricted information. We also need to keep current with any

changes to the restrictions. In this effort to enforce access restrictions we rely on collaboration with the record creators and advice from Jeremy McCoy, the Assistant Attorney General assigned to the Archives. This year we worked with Mr. McCoy on a systematic review of all of the Court records in Archives custody, their applicable restrictions, and how we communicate those restrictions to the public. As a result, we updated a number of our restriction notifications as they appear in our online catalog, especially for those related to restricted jury records.

Reference, Research, Education, and Outreach Services

Reference Services

From October 2023 through May of this year, Reference Services staff assisted over 2,087 in-person patrons, retrieved 3,199 original archival records, fulfilled 3,506 record orders, and answered 6,943 in-depth reference emails. We continue to update online research guides to better assist patrons in locating our expanding online genealogical resources.

Orders for certified copies of vital records (birth, marriage, and death certificates) for legal needs now rival requests for uncertified copies of vital records for genealogical research. These statistics do not include the impressive number of vital records that are over one hundred years old, now available online for free and convenient remote access from home. The higher number of orders is due not only to an increase in requests since the last HRC meeting, but also to IT Deputy Betsy Bodziak's work in providing a more sophisticated means of creating accurate reports from data. This upgrade ensures that every part of a multi-part order is accurately counted, which previously required painstakingly tallying orders manually.



As part of the 2,087 in-person visits, staff also conducted 393 research appointments. While walk-ins tend to dip during winter months and spike during the spring through fall months, appointments tend to remain relatively steady with a core number of intensive researchers. Guests enjoy the advantage of brainstorming by email with archivists before visiting, arriving to

find up to a full cart of records ready and waiting for them. Researchers who made appointments included students, amateur and professional genealogists, authors, archaeologists, and others. Walk-ins went up in March, likely due to documents needed for tax season.



Education and Outreach

Chesapeake Heartlands Community Preservation

Archives Research staff continue to maintain their collaboration with Washington College's Starr Center for the Study of the American Experience and the Chesapeake Heartlands Project. On February 2, this group partnered in an onsite day-long workshop with historical scholars, Washington College and Starr Center educational staff, and local community members. Participants discussed the conservation, preservation, presentation, and viability of hundreds of paper, video, and audio files and records which contain the history of the African American residents of an area where many generations have lived since the end of slavery. Washington College and Starr Center staff displayed the current contents and design of this community collections project through an audio/visual presentation which inspired those in attendance, several of whom had donated family records to the project.

National Park Service Network to Freedom

The Archives' Research Department has been engaged by both the Maryland Department of Tourism and Visit Annapolis and Anne Arundel County, and in association with Chesapeake Crossroads Heritage Area, to promote, advise, and assist numerous historical sites, programs, and institutions to apply for National Park Service Network to Freedom designations. Visit While Annapolis' focus is on entities within the city of Annapolis and the surrounding county, the Maryland Department of Tourism focuses on identifying successful applications which will result in new designations in the southern portion of the state, namely in the counties of Prince George's, Charles, and St. Mary's. The mission of the Network to Freedom is to identify, recognize, promote, and honor events, programs, and sites, which can be linked to the national legacy of the Underground Railroad with documented records. The Archives is a long-standing member of the Network as a research facility by virtue of the work of its Legacy of Slavery program and the hundreds of regular and volunteer staff who have contributed. Assistant State Archivist Emily Oland Squires, Director of Research Education and Outreach Chris Haley and Research Archivist Hannah Lane are helping to lead this work group.

Outreach Programming

Since the last HRC meeting, Archives staff have presented a wide variety of programming, from monthly Lunch and Learn talks to in-person community preservation days and guided tours. These events are more fully documented in this meeting's Chronology document. In summary, the agency's total live (in real time for both onsite and virtual) attendance numbers year-to-date are as follows: January through May 2024: 65 programs with an attendance of 1,812. Among those who presented, Senior Research Archivist Owen Lourie attended and gave remarks at a Bruceville Encampment historical marker dedication which was organized by the Westminster Chapter of the Maryland Sons of the American Revolution. Legacy of Slavery Archivist Hannah Lane gave presentations on African American genealogy to the Crofton and Glen Burnie branches of the Anne Arundel County Public Library, and Elaine Rice Bachmann, Corey Lewis and Emily Oland Squires presented to the Maryland Chapter meeting of the American Records Managers Association.

Jen Abbott, Owen Lourie, and Chris Haley hosted, presented and gave a tour of the Archives building to 16 Historically Black College and Universities journalism professors and one Pulitzer Prize winning journalist, Kimbrielle Kelly, on researching African American history at the Archives. Elaine Rice Bachmann welcomed the group to kick off the day. Discussion at this event focused on the various kinds of records, such as land records, tax assessments, census, certificates of freedom, and manumissions, which one might explore when seeking to investigate the overlooked lives of free and enslaved African Americans both during and after slavery. Emily Oland Squires provided an overview of Archives for the American Association of University Women. Mr. Haley and Ms. Lane also participated in a panel on the controversial, but important language which is used when slavery, inequality, and social justice is broached on marginalized communities. Titled, Sticks and Stones: (De)humanizing Words? Considering the Language of Slavery, Race, and Marginalized Communities, the program looked closely at the ways that language is used by public history professionals, academic historians, and today's communities, to describe current and past peoples and atrocities. The panel also discussed how this language has changed over time. The speakers discussed, from both professional and personal perspectives, the complexities of describing the institution of slavery, the actions of its perpetrators, and slavery's modern legacy to both scholastic and public audiences.

Summer Internship Program

The Archives' summer internship program began on June 5 and will run through August 13, 2024. This summer's program will be smaller than some previous years as budgetary constraints prohibited us from hiring anyone who did not come with their own external funding. Staff applied for fellowships and sought out multiple partnerships and funding opportunities. We are proud to continue our longstanding partnerships with St. John's College and The Starr

Center at Washington College. We will also host a fellow from the Albert Lepage Center for History in the Public Interest at Villanova University. The Maryland Institute for Innovative Computing is funding two Information Technology interns, one for operations and the other for programming.

Orientation for the Internship program is ongoing. Interns will work on previously established projects, performing core mission work in departments throughout the Archives. One student will continue identifying, digitizing, appraising, and accessioning the colonial-era records which make up the Rainbow Books, a series of Revolutionary era documents, in anticipation of the United States semiquincentennial commemorations. Another will review and enter data concerning those incarcerated in the Maryland Penitentiary during the mid-19th century, to add to a demographic study of primary source materials related to racial disparities within the legal system. Information Technology will engage students to assist in the general department responsibilities of programming and management of digital information. Two interns will assist Assistant State Archivist Corey Lewis, as they aid community groups and organizations in the storage and preservation of their records. The two are Venice Beach, an historical Black community in Anne Arundel County, and Blacks of the Chesapeake, an organization which is dedicated to remembering and honoring African American seamen. Conservation Special Collections will benefit from an intern's work on the Mayis project, which represents Maryland's Indigenous history.

Department of Service and Civic Innovation (DSCI)

Under the program direction of Emiy Oland Squires and the supervision of Jennifer Abbott, the Archives is completing its first year as a host site for the Maryland Corps/Service Year Option for the DSCI. Along with the students who will begin work here as interns, the Maryland Corps/Service Year members continue to provide the Archives with substantial physical and intellectual assistance while receiving mentoring from supervisors in their assigned departments. This first year of the program will conclude at the end of August. A second year of the program has recently been approved, and the Archives is currently in the host site application process. If approved, matches with potential members are expected to take place in late June with a targeted program state date of September 11. The Archives looks forward to continuing its support of this important professional development program.

Maryland Lynching Truth and Reconciliation Commission

The Commission held the Frederick County Public Hearing in Frederick at historic Lincoln Elementary School on April 13, 2024. Approximately 100 were in attendance at this onsite event, including several descendants of lynching victims. This hearing recognized the lynchings of <u>James Carroll</u> on April 17, 1879, <u>John H. Biggus</u> on November 23, 1887, and <u>James Bowens</u> on November 16, 1895, all having occurred in Frederick. During the hearing, biographical and genealogical narratives were shared about the lives of Carroll, Biggus, and Bowens, and their murders by local lynch mobs were detailed. Descendants of the victims as well as community representatives were invited to speak during the proceedings, to discuss the impact of these incidents on Frederick and its people. A full recording of the hearing is available on the Commission's YouTube Channel.

The Commission is planning to hold additional hearings across the State throughout 2024. Details will be published on the Commission's <u>website</u> as soon as possible. Members of the public can also virtually attend Commission and Committee meetings held each month, and volunteer to participate in the work of the Commission, by consulting the schedule and online links posted there as well. Additional information about the history of lynching in Maryland can be found on the Archives' <u>Legacy of Slavery website</u>.

In 2021, the Commission was awarded an Emmett Till grant from the US Department of Justice to help support this important work. With these funds, the research company Heritage Associates has been engaged to conduct genealogical research and to identify community members who may have knowledge of or information concerning these lynchings. The group continues to seek descendants of victims and anyone who would like to participate in the telling of these stories. If you have information to share, or would like to participate, please contact Heritage Associates directly. Members of the public may also submit comments <u>online</u> on what reconciliation and restorative justice means to them, and can also email the Commission directly at <u>mltrc@maryland.gov</u>.

Through the Office of the Attorney General, the Commission hired Trish Boyle as project manager. Public relations agency, the Hatcher Firm, was brought on to assist the commissioners in their mandated goal of planning, organizing, promoting, and conducting hearings in every county where lynchings occurred. These are to be completed prior to the Commission's sunset in June 2026. Six hearings for the remaining 12 counties are still to be held. The Archives is represented in all committees of the Commission: Director of Research, Education, and Outreach Chris Haley is a commissioner and he, Assistant State Archivist Emily Oland Squires, and Archivist Hannah Lane, attend all meetings of the main commission, as well as the three subcommittees of Logistics, Research, and Reconciliation.

Special Collections, Conservation and Library Services

Indigenous Archive Project for the Eastern Shore of Maryland

New content from Indigenous community members is set to debut online soon thanks to the generosity of a grant from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority. Oral Historian and Research Consultant, Drew Shuptar-Rayvis (Pocomoke Indian Nation), conducted over 22 field recordings with Indigenous community Elders, leaders, and Tradition-bearers across Eastern Shore counties in Maryland and Delaware. Through the autumn and spring months, Archival Trainee Ame Schimminger edited the machine-generated audio transcripts with Mr. Shuptar-Rayvis's input and clarifications. It is an important value of the project that the narrators maintain intellectual control over their speech. The team communicates with each of the narrators throughout the archiving process to ensure that they are satisfied with the recordings that we are set to preserve. We are currently working to obtain gift agreements from each participant and prepare the recordings for preservation and public access via the Archives' <u>Mayis:</u> Indigenous Records website. The rollout of the interviews and transcripts will be completed just as grant funding ends.

Concurrent with the oral history work, the team has expanded outreach for the Mayis website, seeking resources by and about Indigenous Peoples around the Chesapeake region. Maria Day, Megan Craynon, and Mr. Shuptar-Rayvis presented at professional development training for teachers in Baltimore City Public Schools and at the Maryland Council for Social Studies conference. The Maryland Humanities Council invited them to participate in interviews conducted by Maryland Public Television. The interview segments will be incorporated into an online portal of educator resources and in the Humanities Council's Inquiry Kits. Ms. Day also gave a public presentation about these resources for the nonprofit, Montgomery History, and Mr. Shuptar-Rayvis has spoken about our grant-funded work at various community events and festivals.

Recent Donations and Community Archiving Highlights

Through Mayis, the Special Collections team has gained experience in working with oral historians and developing workflows for transcription and audio preservation. They are now exploring potential partnerships with other communities to assist them in preserving their stories. Increasingly, communities are using current technologies to record their own oral histories. Assistant State Archivist Corey Lewis facilitated a donation of oral history recordings of members of the Broadneck community by the Annual Father's Day Foundation. These interviews take place at Asbury Broadneck United Methodist Church and highlight the African American experience living in Brown's Woods, Mulberry Hill, and other areas on the Broadneck Peninsula located near Annapolis. Archives staff also advises other community archivists planning to undertake oral history recording at community events with the help of volunteer oral historians.

The Venice Beach Community archives committee is an example of a group the Archives has assisted. Venice Beach, an adjacent community to Highland Beach, shares some of the same history on the Annapolis Neck of the Chesapeake Bay as its neighboring communities. Notable African-Americans have lived and vacationed there since the early twentieth century, and the community is seeking to document both its history and its current life along the Bay. Megan Craynon has assisted Corey Lewis in advising the community, regularly attending community meetings, consulting on archival practices, suggesting appropriate materials for a collection, mentoring students in describing and scanning material for public access, and planning community oral history and digitization days. The Archives has incorporated materials documenting the Venice Beach Citizens Association into MSA SC 6386: Venice Beach Citizens Association Collection. Additional oral histories and resident family history digital materials are anticipated this summer as a result of collaborative community collection days.

The Special Collections team has recently worked with Assistant State Archivist Corey . Lewis to connect with the family of Dr. Aris T. Allen and Dr. Faye Watson Allen, to acquire their family papers, memorabilia, and photographs. The Doctors Allen were both medical professionals and leaders in the Annapolis community. Dr. Aris T. Allen served in the House of Delegates from 1967-1974 and 1990-91. Dr. Allen was later elected as a Maryland Senator, serving from 1979-81.

Archives staff are also working with several nonprofit organizations on digitization projects that will enable greater access to their collections. The Society of the War of 1812 in the State of Maryland funded a project to digitize their organization's nineteenth-century minutes and proceedings records, and volunteers from the organization have been trained to digitize some of their less fragile records from the early twentieth-century. Likewise, our team is partnering with officers of the Mountain Club of Maryland to digitize their photograph albums, news bulletins, and council minutes back to December 1934. The Mountain Club funded this project to tell the story of their group's activities in celebration of the organization's 90th anniversary. The Mountain Club's photograph albums from 1934-1949 and 1954 are now accessible to the public online for the first time through the Guide to Special Collections. These scrapbook pages contain detailed captions that give interesting insights into the changes in the state's natural landscapes and recreational areas over the past century.

Caring for Archives Collections with Assistance from Service Year Members

The Special Collections team has benefited from the dedication and enthusiasm of four members of the Governor's Service Year program. Service Year members received training on organizing, rehousing, describing and storing a variety of collection materials, and have assisted Conservator Camille DiMarco with rehousing and labeling government record volumes with deteriorating leather covers. They have inventoried physical collections, including several larger collections that have been backlogged from the pandemic: the Bready Marylandia postcards; additions to the Seitz-Hoffman Collection of genealogy papers and photographs; and a posthumous donation of research materials and photographs from Baltimore County historian John McGrain. Service Year members are also assisting in a project to consolidate oversized memorabilia, posters, and artifacts in Governor William Donald Schaefer's collections. They have helped complete a box-level inventory and shelving for the papers of Southern Maryland policy-maker Gary V. Hodge, and enabled us to pass the halfway point of a project to rehouse architect Bryden Hyde's drawings and blueprints, which arrived in 235 metal tubes, and to reformat the donor's preliminary inventory.

Conservation for State Agencies

Conservators assisted a number of state agencies with projects, the most public of these being two temporary exhibitions requested by Governor Wes Moore and First Lady Dawn Moore. Our team cut mat boards and assisted with framing and mounting labels for the February Black History Month exhibition at Government House, curated by Commission on Artistic Property staff.



Conservator Jennifer Cruickshank created a special mounting of three portraits by Kate Mackubin to highlight the significance of this Maryland artist's work in a Women's History Month exhibition, also at Government House. Again, the team aided our curator colleagues with mounting labels to help with the installation in a fast turnaround. Librarians from the Thurgood Marshall State Law Library approached the department with a funded project to create custom book enclosures for the Law Library's special collections. Conservator Camille DiMarco acquired the materials and scheduled time to create a combination of archival cardboard wrap-arounds, mylar sleeves, and specialized wrap-arounds for 37 of the Law Library's rare volumes. The custom wrap-arounds included Folger-style openings where the book's historic spine is visible on the shelf. The Law Library also requested exterior spine repairs on ten of the books.

Conservation also completed book and paper repairs on a Bible signed by Clerks of the Court of Appeals to preserve it and prepare it for installation in an exhibit case. The book cover had signs of heavy wear, adhesive tape had been used along the interior spine, and the signature pages had significant tears. After the paper treatment was complete, results now showcase the clerks' signatures and the book is functional and improved for display purposes.

The Supreme Court of Maryland placed an order with our team to create a custom, cloth display box for a wooden gavel given to the Court of Appeals by parishioners in St. Mary's County on the 250th anniversary of the founding of Maryland in 1884. Our team worked with the DAAP Department to make three-dimensional imaging of the gravel as part of the Court's request.

Library

A challenging budget year, and other resourcing issues, have led to a redirection in the work of the Library. As mentioned at the previous Hall of Records Commission meeting the focus of library work has shifted from ordering and cataloging additions to attending to secondary projects. This shift of attention, while created by external challenges, has on the positive side resulted in the clearing up of some legacy work.

Christine Alvey and library volunteer Betty Gosnell have recently cataloged over 100 items, a donation from food historian Joyce White related to <u>MSA SC 6316: The Great Maryland Recipe</u> <u>Hunt Collection</u>. This donation is representative of ongoing efforts of the Archives Library to collaborate with other units. This collaboration fosters connections between library holdings and archival collections, supporting both the work of the staff and the research projects of the public.

Government Publications

The backlog of print government reports and publications processing, a legacy both of COVID and the challenging resource issue of staff time, has been completely remediated. Librarian Christine Alvey has brought both print and electronic accessions up to date for government reports and publications received.

There is ongoing dialogue concerning the future of print and electronic publishing of government reports and publications, both internally and with sister state agencies. This conversation may open up opportunities for partnership and collaboration, and has already strengthened interagency relationships.

Opening Remarks / Special Announcements

The Chair thanked State Archivist Elaine Rice Bachmann for her remarks during the unveiling of the official portrait of Chief Judge Joseph Getty in the Supreme Court's courtroom on May 6, 2024. He also thanked the Archives' curatorial staff for their work in preparing the portrait for unveiling.

Ms. Bachmann thanked Chief Judge Getty for his donation to the State Archives of historic items featured in the portrait. These included two 18th-century books, one owned by Maryland's first governor Thomas Johnson and the other by James Wilson, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and a personal copy of the seminal work on the history of the court of appeals by Carol T. Bond. He also donated the gavel depicted in the portrait, made of wood from the Wye Oak.

State Archivist's Report

Ms. Bachmann invited Commission members, representatives, and staff to the unveiling of the portrait of former State Archivist Timothy D. Baker, time to be announced.

Ms. Bachmann recognized the work of Assistant State Archivist Corey Lewis, CIO Wei Yang, and Deputy CIO Betsy Bodziak in developing clear projections of the funding needed over the next five years to accept, store, and maintain electronic records created by Maryland government agencies.

Dr. Rob Schoeberlein, Baltimore City Archivist, thanked the Baltimore City Department of Legislative Reference for the addition of two, full-time City employees in support of the Archives.

Kathryn Baringer, Director of Appraisal and Description, thanked Assistant Attorney General Jeremy McCoy for his assistance in a systematic review of access restrictions on court records. Ms. Bachmann noted the constant vigilance needed to keep abreast of all legislated changes to records access, citing the Judge Andrew F. Wilkinson Judicial Security Act of 2024 which shields judges' personal information from public disclosure.

Emily Oland Squires, Assistant State Archivist, thanked St. John's College, Washington Colleges' C.V. Starr Center for the Study of the American Experience, University of Maryland, Baltimore County's Maryland Institute for Innovative Computing, and Villanova University's Albert LePage Center for providing direct funding for Archives' internships this summer.

Maria Day, Senior Director of Special Collections, Conservation, & Library Services, acknowledged the contributions of research consultant and oral historian Drew Shuptar-Rayvis in strengthening partnerships with tribal communities while conducting over 22 field recordings with Indigenous community Elders, leaders, and Tradition-bearers across Eastern Shore counties in Maryland and Delaware.

Ms. Day also thanked interns Ame Schimminger and Autumn Powell for their many contributions to the educational and outreach components of the Indigenous Archive Project, which was funded by an 18-month grant from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority.

Rachel Frazier thanked Reference volunteers for their work providing patrons with specialized genealogical research assistance.

Ms. Bachmann noted that June 13 was the 150th anniversary of Frederick Douglass's visit to the Maryland State House, during which he recited from memory the entirety of George Washington's resignation speech. She invited Commission members, representatives and staff to a Maryland 250 kickoff event at the State House on Saturday, June 15, featuring a Douglass reenactor.

Ms. Bachmann recognized Liz Coelho, Director of Special Projects, for her work in organizing the meetings of the Commission since 2015. Ms. Coelho will retire from state employment in August.


