MARYLAND LEGISLATURE.

ANNAPOLIS, March 4th, 1852.

Petitions and Memorials.—By the Speaker, from Charles B. Calvert, enclosing resolutions of the Maryland Agricultural Society in favor of the sale of potatoes, &c., by weight, &c. By Mr. Bateman, from the Commissioners of Harford county, for a re assessment of property in said county. By Mr. Smith, from 91 citizens, that potatoes may be sold by weight. By Mr. —, from John L. Ensor, to refund him an overpayment into the treasury. By Mr Ford, from 21 ladies of Baltimore county, in favor of the ten hour system of labor; also, from 63 citizens of said county, a similar petition. By Mr. Willis, from citizens of Talbot county, against the setting of gill-nets and stakes in Choptank river. By Mr. Slade, from Thos. Williams and others of Baltimore county, in favor of the ten hour system of labor. By Mr Parran, from Basil S. Dixon and another citizen, for certain relief. By Mr. Willis, from citizens of Talbot county, to change the time of electing overseer of the poor in said county. By Mr. McElfresh, from the Mutual Insurance Company of Frederick County, that said company may be included in any law passed to exempt premium notes from execution.

Mr. Hughes, from the committee on the contested election for Register of Wills of Howard county, reported that they had examined the ballots and testimony in the case, and find that the parties have received an equal number of votes, and recommend a new election, &c.

Mr. Stewart obtained leave to report a bill to exempt from jury duty the members of the Monumental Hose Company.

Bills Reported.—By Mr. Jenkins, requiring the Assessors of Charles county to levy \$2,300 additional tax for the payment of primary school teachers for the years 1843, '49, '50 and '51. By Mr. Wolf, granting Wm. Corby power to sell certain estate of J. Charlton, deceased, in Williamsport. By Mr. Davis, to incorporate Cemetery Companies—ordered to be printed. By Mr. Stewart, to prohibit the collecting of tolls on the Washington Turnpike road within the city of Baltimore. By Mr. Fairall, to provide for the destruction of wolves, wild cats, and foxes, in Allegany county. By Mr. Bateman, to incorporate Hall's Cross Roads Division, No. 121, Sons of Temperance.

Sundry Bills.—The bill to lay off Anne Arundel county into election districts, passed yesterday, was reconsidered, and laid on the table. The bill to establish the ten hour system of labor in this State came up as the order of the day; amendments were offered, when it was postponed until tomorrow. The bill to establish the Maryland and Virginia boundary line, between Smith's Point and the Atlantic ocean, (which, said Mr. Waters, now rests only upon tradition,) was taken up and discussed, and passed. Mr. Waters offered a general bill, as a substitute for the bill submitted yesterday by Mr. Stewart, in the contested election case for commissioner in Somerset county, which was ordered to be printed, when the whole subject was postponed to Tuesday. Bill to change the name of Charles Carroll McTavish to Charles Carroll, was indefinitely postponed, on motion of Mr. Hanson. The bill to carry into effect the powers invested by the Constitution in the Commissioner of Lotteries, was passed. The bill creating a new election district in Frederick county out of parts of Nos. 8, 9 and 11. The bill creating a new election district in Carroll county was passed.

The House adjourned.

SENATE.—The President laid before the Senate a communication from the President of the Maryland State Agricultural Society, similar to the one presented in the House

On motion of Mr. Williams, leave was given to Messrs. Williams, Ely and Weber, to report an exemption bill.

Mr. Ely made a favorable report on the bill changing the lines between districts 3 and 9, in Baltimore county.

The Senate concurred in the unfavorable report made by the judiciary committee on the petition of Ethelbert and Taney.

Mr. Grason made a report upon the bills for repairing and furnishing the Senate Chamber, and reported a bill to pay the same.

The bill to refund Emily McTavish certain State taxes overpaid, was passed, and is now a law.

Mr. Farnandis obtained leave to report a supplement to the charter of the Bel-Air Turnpike Co.

Mr. Williams reported a bill to carry into effect section 39 of article 4 of the constitution.

The bill to prescribe the duties of the Comptroller was made the order of the day for March 9th.

The bill imposing a fine for circulating foreign bank notes of a less denomination than five dollars, was postponed to March 11th.

The bill to purchase certain books for certain courts for Baltimore city and county, was passed; also the bill for the relief of the Associate Congregation of Baltimore.

Confirmations—Yesterday, the appointments of O. P. Merryman, J. C. Le Grand and Michael McBlair were confirmed by the Senate.
