A Copy of the REMONSTRANCE of the Freeholders and Freemen of Anne-Arundel County, to Messieurs Worthington, Hammond, Hall, and Johnson, their Representatives in Assembly; accompanied with some Instructions to them.

GENTLEMEN,

THE Shock received by AMERICA, and our Province in particular, from some late unconstitutional Measures, pursued by the British Parliament, in Derogation, as we conceive, of our ancient inherent Rights and Privileges, as Freemen and liege Subjects of the Crown of Great-Britain, requires us to be exceedingly circumspect with Regard to our LIBERTIES, and early to remonstrate to you Our Representatives in Assembly convened, in Support of our RIGHTS thereto; giving you at the same Time, some few Instructions, which we entreat you will specially attend to, and punctually observe.

By the unalterable Law of Nature, we look upon ourselves to be Freemen: Providence seemingly averse to the Miseries of Slavery, hath placed us in the happy Estate of Freedom: And we are conscious to ourselves, that we have in no wise forfeited, or departed with our natural Right thereto. By the Common Law of Great-Britain, the Law of our Land, and declaratory in this Respect of the Law of Nature, and consequently of the Liberty of the Subject, we look upon ourselves also to be FREEMEN: Equally Free, with our Fellow-Subjects, resident within the Realm of Great-Britain: And we trust we shall be esteemed so, by our Sovereign and the World, until it can be rationally shewn, that mere Inhabitaney in America, or any where else, within the Dominions of the Crown of Great-Britain, but without the Land thereof; is sufficient of itself to strip an ENGLISHMAN or his POSTERITY of their natural and civil BIRTHRIGHT, we mean, their FREEDOM: On this Freedom of the Subject asserted by us, dependeth, in our Opinions, the Necessity of his Assenting by himself, or his Representatives, to Laws, in order to his being bound thereby; and from such Assent, ariseth, as we take it, the Obligation of all human Laws. How then in Point of NATURAL or CIVIL LAW, are we rightly chargeable, or liable to be burdened, by the STAMP-ACT, attempted to be imposed upon us by the Mother-Country? Have we assented to it personally or representatively? If we have not, which is notorious to the World, the MINISTER'S virtual Representation, adduced argumentatively, in Support of the TAX on us, is fantastical and frivolous. Can the Parliament by the Fiction of a virtual Representation impose one Law on us, without our Assent; they may also another; and so on, ad infinitum: We cannot see where the Line is to be drawn: And each new Law so imposed on us, may pave the Way to some new Tax; each new Tax, to some new Oppression;—Oppression (unresisted) leads in a direct and open Path to Bondage; and that to the immediate Privation, and utter Destruction of Liberty,—of Property,—and of all, that is dear to us: The Inconveniencies therefore, arising on the Supposition of the Parliament having any such Power, as that of laying Taxes on us, without our Assent, vested in it; is in our

Opinion, no very inconclusive Argument to the Being and Existence of such a Power, in the Legislature of any State whatsoever, much more of that of Great-Britain, which glories in the FREEDOM of its SUBJECTS.

By the Constitutional Laws of our Mother-Country, the Birthright of every English Subject, and consequently of us Americans, liege Subjects also of the Crown; It is Ordained and Enacted, "That no Aid, Prize, Tax, Tollage, &c. shall be taken or levied without the Good-Will, and Assent of the Freemen of the Land."—And by the CHARTER of our PROVINCE, it is Expressly granted, "That the King, his Heirs and Successors, shall at no Time hereafter, set or make, or cause to be set, any Imposition, Custom, or other Taxation, Rate or Contribution whatsoever, in or upon the Dwellers and Inhabitants of the aforesaid Province, for their Lands, Tenements, Goods or Chattels, within the said Province, or to be laden and unladen within any the Ports or Harbours of the said Province: And it is charged and commanded, that the above Declaration be henceforward, from Time to Time, received and allowed in all his Courts, and before all the Judges of the King, his Heirs and Successors, for a sufficient and lawful Discharge, Payment and Acquittance. And all Officers and Ministers of the King, his Heirs and Successors, are Enjoined, upon Pain of High Displeasure of the Crown, that they do not presume, at any Time, to attempt any Thing to the contrary of the Premises, or that they do in any Sort withstand the same; but that they be at all Times aiding and assisting, as is fitting, unto the Proprietor of our Province, &c. and to the Inhabitants, and Merchants thereof, their Servants, Ministers, Factors and Assigns, in the full Use and Fruition of the Benefit of this the Charter."

And by another Paragraph in the same Charter, the Privilege of Legislation is expressly confined to the Proprietor, and the Freemen of our Province. The Words of it are as follow: "And we do grant, free, full and absolute Power, unto the Proprietor and his Heirs, for the good and happy Government of the said Province, to ordain, make, enact, and under his and their Seals, to publish any Laws whatsoever, appertaining either unto the public State of the said Province, or unto the private Utility of particular Persons, according unto their best Directions, of and with the Advice, Assent, and Approbation of the FREEMEN of the said Province, or the greater Part of them, or of their Delegates or Deputies, whom for the Enacting of the said Laws, when, and as often as Need shall require, we will, that the Proprietor, and his Heirs, shall assemble in such Sort and Form, as to him or them shall seem best, &c."

Hence the Foundation of our Claim to be affected by no Law, or burdened with any Kind of Tax, but what is laid on us by Assent of our Representatives, in Assembly convened, agreeable with the Fundamental Laws of the Constitution of our Mother-Country;—our Rights and Privileges as Englishmen, declared and confirmed by our Charter;—and the uninterrupted Usages and Practice of our Province, from its first Settlement to the present Time. And

we do unanimously Protest, against our being charged in any other Manner, and by any other Powers whatsoever: And we do request of you our Representatives, that this our Protest may be entered, and stand recorded, in your Journal, among the Proceedings of your House; if it may regularly be done.

As Subjects of the Crown of Great-Britain, bearing all of us, true and faithful Allegiance to our Sovereign; we supplicate his most gracious Protection: And as we conceive ourselves to stand in equal Relation to him, with our Fellow-Subjects, residing within the Realm of Great-Britain, altho' we are so far distant therefrom; we therefore humbly hope, an equal Share of his Countenance and Favour with them: We most submissively pray of him also, the Redress of our Grievances, which are numerous and great, and in particular, the Repeal, or even the Suspension of the Operation of the Stamp-Act among us, until the Legality of imposing the same on the COLONIES, be fairly discussed between his American, and British Subjects.

And to the End that we may have your best and most effectual Services rendered us, in all and singular the Premises, whereon we have largely remonstrated to you; and may also hope to obtain speedy and suitable Redress of our Grievances, from the Crown, with the Repeal, or even the Suspension of the Operation of the Stamp-Act among us; WE ENJOIN and REQUIRE YOU, to use your earnest Endeavours;

I. That our Essential Inherent Rights, and Constitutional Privileges, derived to us, as British Subjects, from the clear Fountain of the British Laws—declared and confirmed to us by our Charter—and the Usages and Customs of our Province, be clearly and distinctly Expresed and Asserted by You in General Assembly; and in proper Stile and Manner (which we submit to the Judgment and Discretion of your Honourable House,) be entered also on your Journal, among your RESOLVES.

II. That a Committee be appointed early in the Session by your House, and furnished with due Instructions, to attend at the Congress to be held at New-York, the first Day of next Month, there to meet the Commissioners from the other Provinces on the Continent, agreeable with the Proposal in the Massachusetts Circular Letter, in order to confer on the Circumstances of our Country, and join in an humble and dutiful Petition to his Majesty, for Relief from the Stamp-Act, with its numerous Train of complicated Evils; and for Redress of all other of our Grievances.

III. We recommend it to you; (as in Gratitude we are bound) to move in your House for a proper Address of Thanks to be presented to General CONWAY, and Colonel ISAAC BARRE, those worthy Patriots, and distinguished Assertors of British and American Liberty.

Other Matters unconnected with the above, and which may happen to fall under your Considerations, in the Course of the Session of Assembly; we leave totally to your Skill and Management; and doubt not but you will acquit yourselves of the Trusts reposed in you, with the usual Satisfaction to yourselves, your Country, and Us your Constituents.

To Mr. GREEN,
IT is a Question frequently put in Conversation, *How shall Business be Transacted, should there be no Stamped Paper?* But as the above Question is very general, and the Reasoning upon it hath appeared to me to be too vague, I have endeavour'd by the following Queries to state it with more Precision.

1st. Hath the Legislature Authority to enact a Law that all Contracts shall be void, that Property shall stagnate, and the Administration of Justice totally cease?

2^d. Suppose a Law should be made without such Design being clearly expressed, would a Construction, bringing it to the Effect suggested in the above Quere upon an Event unforeseen, and unprovided for by the Legislature, be maintainable?

3^d. Should the Commissioners fail in having the Paper stamped according to the Directions of the Statute, or the stamped Paper miscarry at Sea, would the Power to make Contracts remain, might our Trade be continued, Property be circulated, and all Violations of Men's Rights in their Persons, Liberty and Estates, be redressed in the present ordinary Course, or not?

4th. If the present ordinary Course might be pursued upon either of the above Events, upon what Principle would it be?

5th. If no stamped Paper is to be got, is it not as impossible for *A* or *B* to use it, as it would be if it did not exist?

If it is objected that the People's not having the Use of the stamped Paper is their own Fault: Quere,

6th. Who are meant by the Term *People*, are all the Individuals of the Province meant by it, if so, is the Fact True? Are some Individuals only meant, if so, are any other than such to suffer for their Conduct; or in other Words, would it consist with Justice to punish *A* for the Behaviour of *B*?

A Letter from Boston in New-England, dated June 3, breathes the following Complaint.

OUR Trade is in a most deplorable Situation, not one fifth Part of the Vessels now employed in the West India Trade, as was before the late Regulation; our Cash almost gone before the Stamp and Post-Office Acts are to operate; Bankruptcies multiplied, our Fears increased, and the Friends of Liberty under the greatest Despondency: What these Things will End in, Time only can discover.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in Bourdeaux, to his Friend in Limerick, July 6, 1765.

"The Attention of Bourdeaux is now taken up by a famous Physician, who cures most Disorders by the Means of Simples; by looking into the Eyes of any Person, he not only tells what Disorders they may have, but those they have already undergone; at what Time, and how they were treated for it; he is never out upon those Occasions. A young Couple, People of Fashion, that were married about a Month, attended him a few Days ago; the Lady had some Complaints, she guessed the Cause of them, but went for Diversion to consult the Doctor. After due Inspection, he asked her, whether he might tell her Disorder before the Gentleman then present (meaning her Husband) who stood by, enjoying his Wife's innocent Mirth. She answered with a Smile in the Affirmative: So the Doctor begun by telling her, that she was then about 18 Years old, that at the Age of 1; she was brought to Bed of a Daughter, and the Year following of another; that she took Remedies which indeed disguised her Situation, but drove the Milk back into her Blood, and brought on Disorders, which would shortly manifest themselves.

The Lady fainted away; the Gentleman sneaked off, and has not been heard of since. What is very remarkable, no Ladies have since asked the Doctor's Advice while any Witnesses were present."

Extract of a Letter from Wareham in Dorsetshire, August 10, 1765.

"This little Town has afforded a Pleasure incident since the Great Patriot came into the neighbourhood: An honest-hearted Briton sent a Salmon to Mr. Pitt, with the following Note: "I am an Englishman, and therefore love Liberty, and You Sir; be pleased to accept of this Fish as a Mark of my Esteem; were every Scale a Diamond, it should have been at your Service."

Yesterday a Man, who goes by the Name of Trump, and belongs to one of the Hampshire Stages, eat five Pounds and a Half of Beef-Steaks, and two large Bunches of Onions, fried, at an Ale-House in Gray's-Inn Lane; a three-penny Loaf, and drank two Pots of Porter, for a trifling Wager. His Dinner is generally three Pounds of solid Meat, and one Pot of Porter, with Bread, &c. in Proportion; but he neither eats Breakfast or Supper. [Nor ought he to eat Dinner above twice a Week.]

Extract of a Letter from Dublin, August 8.

"This Day Newgate was broke open by Soldiers and the Liberty Boys, who turned every Prisoner out, Young and Old; all the City is in an Uproar; the Reason of this I cannot possibly tell, but there was a Man shot on Sunday Morning by a Soldier who was patrolling to quell a Mob; a Serjeant, a Cobbler, and the Soldier were sent to Newgate, and were refused Bail, which, it is said, incensed the Soldiers; it is thought there will be terrible Work; there is not one Prisoner in Newgate this Night."

B O S T O N, October 3.

For some Days past there has been shewn in this Town a remarkable large live Hog, whose Weight is 973 lb, is upwards of 10 Feet long from the snout to the End of the Tail, and in Height 4 Feet 2 Inches. It was raised at Cape Anne, is between 2 and 3 Years old, and is thought to be the largest ever teen in this Country.

N E W P O R T, October 7.

We hear by Letters from New-York, that the Boston Commissioners, after their Arrival there, waited upon Lieut. Gov. Colden, and acquainted him with their Business in New-York. He received them very coldly, and told them, that the Meeting of the Commissioners was unconstitutional, unprecedented, and unlawful, and that he should give them no Kind of Countenance or Encouragement.

We hear from Boston, that last Week the commanding Officer of the King's Ships in that Port was arrested, and taken into Custody, for detaining Capt. Hulme's Ship, which brought over the Stamped Papers.

By a Gentleman from Boston, we are informed, that a Ship arrived there last Week from London; and that a Letter from the Massachusetts Agent advised, that the Stamp-Act would probably soon be repealed.

Extract of a Letter from New-York, October 3.

"On Monday Afternoon the Commissioners had a Meeting, at which were present those from Rhode-Island, Boston, and S. Carolina, and a standing Committee from the Lower House of this Province, appointed to hold a Correspondence with the neighbouring Governments upon the Stamp-Act, &c. On Tuesday arrived an Express from the Speaker of the Maryland Assembly, informing, that at the Request of some of the Members, Governor Sharpe immediately and cheerfully called the Assembly, who appointed three of the House to attend the Congress, who are expected in Town this Evening. Governor SHARPE is much applauded for his Conduct.

A N N A P O L I S, October 24.

We are inform'd from New-York, that it was suppos'd the Congress held there, would break up about the 19th Instant: It was Compos'd of Twenty-eight Gentlemen, from the following Governments; South-Carolina Three; Maryland Three; New-Castle, Kent and Sussex, Three; Pennsylvania Three; New-Jersey Three; New-York, Five; Connecticut Three; Rhode-Island Two; and the Massachusetts-Bay Three.

The General Assembly of this Province, is to meet here on Thursday next.

We have certain Information from Virginia, that the General Assembly of that Colony, which was to have met on the 17th of this

Instant, is further Prorogued to the 4th of March 1766.

In a Letter from a Gentleman of the 21st Instant, now over in Dorchester County, he Writes, that he "was an Eye-witness to a very uncommon Operation, perform'd on last Friday, by Dr. Thomas Bond, of Philadelphia, he cut John Hall Caille, a Child of 4 Years old, for the Stone, and extracted one from him about the Size of an Almond, it weigh'd 3 dw. 10 gr. it was very hard, and very light for its Size: The Operation was perform'd very quick, and the Child is now in a fair Way of Recovery."
